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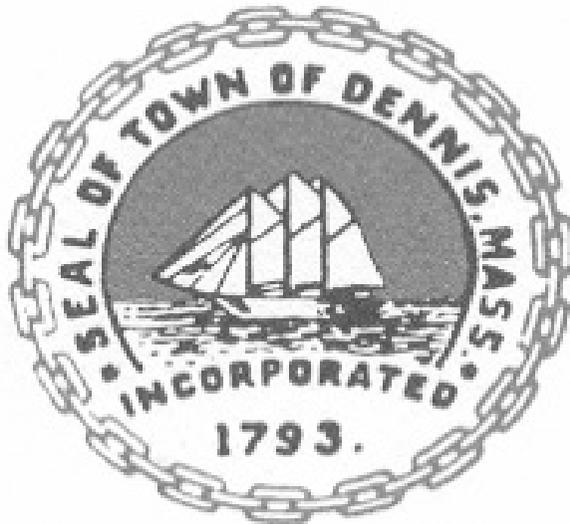

Charles E. "Charlie" Chamberlain Jr.

Charlie served 15 years as a member of the Finance Committee, the last 3 years as chairman. Through the years he was involved with many Town committees including, DPW Building Committee, Fire Services Needs Committee, Community Preservation Committee, and served as Vice Chairman of the Land Acquisition Committee. He also served many years on the Dennis Water District Finance Committee, the Dennis Chamber of Commerce, and the Cape Cod Economic and Development Commission.

Nancy was a member of the Dennis Historical Society. Nancy along with some friends made the quilt that hangs in Dennis Town Hall.

Wesley served the Town of Dennis for 32 years in a variety of roles as Volunteer Firefighter, Special Police Officer, Shellfish Constable, Natural Resource Officer, and Harbormaster.

Annual Report of the Board of Selectmen

As we reflect back on the past year, it could be described as a year of transition. Interim Town Administrator Warren Rutherford was hired until the beginning of the year as the Board sought a new Administrator for the Town. The Board unanimously voted to appoint Richard White, as the Town's Administrator. His service to the Town began in January 2009. In May, the Board bid farewell to Charles Crowell. Charlie served on the Board of Selectmen for the Town of Dennis for the past 15 years. We welcomed Alan Tuttle who was elected to a three-year term.

As is customary, budget discussions began early in the year. Taking into consideration the Town's capital needs, and the likelihood of the need for a school budget override, the Board directed administration to bring forth a balanced budget within the limits of Proposition 2 ½. The focus and priority became the need to fund the maintenance or replacement of major equipment and infrastructure. Continued delay in the acquisition of new and replacement equipment is straining our maintenance and operational department budgets. Spending money on equipment that has outlived their useful life is a waste of taxpayer dollars and further delays in repairs to our infrastructure is resulting in higher costs. Our continued delays in the repair and maintenance of our docks, beach parking lots and bulkheads and roads, etc. not only costs more, we are running the risk of losing valuable town assets and future revenues. A \$1.4 million Proposition 2½ Capital Exclusion override for capital expenditures was passed at the Annual Town Election.

The Dennis Yarmouth Regional School District assessment to each of the two Towns was once again allocated in accordance with the "Chapter 70" formula as sought by the Town of Yarmouth. The Board of Selectmen continues to monitor the impact of the formula on our municipal finances and the progress of our schools in improving MCAS test scores, decreasing the drop-out rate and maintaining overall adequate yearly progress. Faced with difficult choices the School Committee implemented a number of cost saving measures in order to bring forward a FY 2010 budget that

was level with FY 2009. However, this did not equate to level assessments to Dennis and Yarmouth. As predicted several years ago by Dennis' consultant, the Department of Education continues to adjust the Chapter 70 formula so that towns reach a maximum local contribution foundation target of 82.5%. Dennis has historically been over 90% and has therefore seen a reduction in the equitable distribution. Conversely, the Town of Yarmouth has seen an incremental increase as its funding level has been less than 80% of the target. In these most difficult economic conditions, we applaud the School Committee, Superintendent, teachers and support staff of both the Dennis Yarmouth Regional School District and the Cape Cod Regional Technical School for their dedication and outstanding efforts to provide a quality education for the children of our town.

During the year, we all felt the economic squeeze and the Town's budget was no exception. News from the State warned of revenue deficits that may require mid-year cuts (again) in local aid. The Board requested that a freeze on all non-essential expenditures be put in place. Reductions in the FY 2010 operating budget amounted to \$524,000 which included approximately \$250,000 in Quinn bill appropriations for the police department. After much discussion and input, the Town changed to county regional fire dispatch in October. Our appreciation to the members of the Fire Department and to Chief Dellner for a smooth transition.

We are experiencing the worst economic decline in many years and the implications compelled the Board to instruct the department managers to bring forward a FY 2011 budget that will not require an override. Governor Patrick continues to deal with a state budget deficit. While any reductions in our state aid will result in the need for further reductions, our relatively minor reliance on state aid will not have the horrendous consequences that so many other cities and towns will face over the next several years. The schools, on the other hand, are of great concern.

The Board members were pleased to not only look back on the completion of the Bridge Street Project also known as the Sesuit Creek Restoration Project, but also to note that it received the Coastal America Award, the highest conservation award

bestowed by the White House in a ceremony in September. The portion of Route 134 south of Bob Crowell Road to Route 28 was renamed the Charles E. Chamberlain, Jr. Parkway in a dedication in late September. At the Special Fall Town Meeting the Josiah Dennis Manse refurbishment project received support. This project, at a cost of \$1.9 million, will restore the Manse to its former glory and will be completed in 18 months.

The Board also notes the opening of Sea View Park in Dennisport and its use by both residents and visitors alike. We are looking forward to the opening of Bass River Park in West Dennis in June of 2010.

We take this opportunity to thank the many volunteers who serve on our committees, commissions and boards. Without their dedication and service to the process of our local government, the challenge of providing the Town's people with proper and timely regulatory and advisory functions could not be met. We also extend our sincerest appreciation for the service provided by our municipal staff throughout the year. And most importantly, we thank the citizens of the Town that participate in their government by voting and attending Town Meetings. Please contact any member of the Board of Selectmen to discuss any matter of Town concern. It is an honor to serve you.

It has been used quite frequently and is a time saver for the office. Kathleen has kept up to pace with our Database for the State Ethics Commission and has taken on many new challenges.

The fall proved to be a very busy time for us. With the passing of Senator Ted Kennedy, the Town Clerk Office's across the state were required to hold a mandatory Special State Primary in December. Fortunately, the Town of Dennis has the most efficient and knowledgeable election workers, which helped our office, get through our first Election in our new working capacity.

To end the year, we had our Records Retention shredding day. This will be an ongoing process throughout the town and throughout the years to come.

Getting ready for the 2010 Federal Census has been a daunting task. The Federal Census is done every 10 years and assists in determining the funding based on the population in town.

In closing, the Town Clerk's office has many challenges and goals. While working as a team, I find that we can achieve anything.

ANNUAL TOWN MEETING

May 5, 2009

Robert C. Chamberlain, Moderator, called the Annual Town Meeting held at the Nathaniel H. Wixon Middle School to order at 7:06 p.m. He declared a quorum present and noted that the Warrant had been posted by George Sawyer, Constable. Tellers were George McDonald, Robert Mezzadri, Richard Mulholland, Thomas Perrino, John Schnaible and Paul Covell, Head Teller.

On motion of Finance Committee Chairman James Plath, duly seconded, it was unanimously voted to waive the formal reading of the Warrant.

Moderator Chamberlain asked the assembly to kindly rise and salute the flag.

A Proclamation was presented by Selectman Heidi Schadt to Selectman Charles F. Crowell for his dedicated service to the Town. Charlie served fifteen years on the Board being the longest sitting member since the five member board was established. Charlie will be missed by everyone.

Selectman Wayne Bergeron presented retiring Town Clerk Jacquelyn K. Souza with a Proclamation and thanking her for her 25 years of dedicated service to the Town of Dennis.

Finance Committee Member William Crowell presented commemorative plaques to outgoing Finance Committee Members Theodore Dumas, Michael Brennan and Kevin McGrath and thanked them for their exceptional service to the committee and the Town.

The Henry C. Boles Achievement Awards were presented by Committee Member Julia Johnson. The Henry C. Boles Achievement Award Committee was named in honor of the late Selectman Henry C. Boles, who served from 1973 to 1977. Mr. Boles' leadership and extensive personal contribution to town programs was largely responsible for Dennis winning recognition in

1978 as an All-American Town. Mr. Boles set a high standard of excellence for citizens' participation in town government. He died in 1979. The committee honors the memory of Henry Boles by encouraging our younger residents to exhibit examples of citizenship and community involvement.

The Certificates and \$100 US Savings Bonds were awarded to Miss Nora Bowie and Mr. Jared Crosby, students at the Ezra Baker School; and Miss Olivia Bowie and Mr. Peter Julian, students at the Nathaniel H. Wixon Middle School.

All of the recipients are a credit to their families, their schools and our community. They are leaders among their peers.

Bobbie Trepte, wife of the honored Donald Trepte, presented the 2009 Donald Trepte Memorial Scholarship Award to Mr. Patrick Julian. Patrick is an all around outstanding student who has a great interest in the environment, in humanity, and in recreation.

(b) Amend the Dennis Zoning By-law Section 2.1.2 to change the date reference for the Zoning Map to December 18, 2008

The boundaries of the districts are defined and bounded on the map entitled "Town of Dennis Zoning Map", dated ~~September 24, 2007~~ **December 18, 2008** on file with the Town Clerk. That map and all explanatory matter thereon are hereby made a part of this By-law, together with any amendments adopted by vote of the Town Meeting.

(c) amend the Dennis Zoning By-law by making the noted additions and deletions to Section 11 Wind Energy Facilities

Section 11 Wind Energy Facilities

11.1 Purpose. The purpose of this section is to encourage the use of wind energies by allowing wind energy technologies to be utilized, while protecting public health and safety and

minimizing the impacts of wind facilities on the character of neighborhoods, on property values, on the scenic, historic, and environmental resources of the Town.

11.2 Special Permit Granting Authority. The Planning Board shall be the special permit granting authority (SPGA) for wind facilities requiring a Special Permit under this by-law.

11.3 Wind Energy Facilities shall be divided into the following three categories for location and permitting requirements.

11.3.1 ~~RESERVED~~ **Systems less than 10 kW – herein referred to as Residential Scale Wind Facility**

11.3.2 Systems less than 30 kW – herein referred to as Small Scale Wind Facility

11.3.3 Systems of between 30kW but less than 500 kW – herein referred to as Medium Scale Wind Facility

11.3.4 Systems of 500kW and larger – herein referred to as Large Scale Wind Facility

11.4 Permit Requirements

11.4.1 ~~RESERVED~~ **Residential Scale Wind Facilities shall be allowed subject to the issuance of a Building Permit and the requirements of Section 11.6.3 below.**

11.4.2 Small Scale Wind Facilities shall require the issuance of a Special Permit subject to the requirements of Section 11.6.2 below.

11.4.3 Medium Wind Facilities shall require the issuance of a Special Permit subject to the requirements of Section 11.6.3.2 below.

11.4.3 ~~4~~ **Medium and Large Scale Wind Facilities shall require the issuance of a Special Permit subject to the requirements of Section 11.6.3.1 below.**

11.5 Definitions:

Blade – Extensions from the hub which are designed to catch the wind and turn the rotor to generate electricity.

Blade-Tip Height - The height as measured from the grade of the land below to the highest extension of the blade.

Cut-out Wind Speed – The high wind speed at which the Facility must shut-down ~~and turn perpendicular to the wind~~ to protect itself from being overpowered, typically 56 mph.

Hub – The center of the rotor to which the blades are attached.

Hub Height – The height as measured from the grade of the land below the wind Facility to the center of the rotor or hub.

Nacelle – The frame and housing at the top of the tower. It protects the gear box and generator from weather and helps control the mechanical noise level.

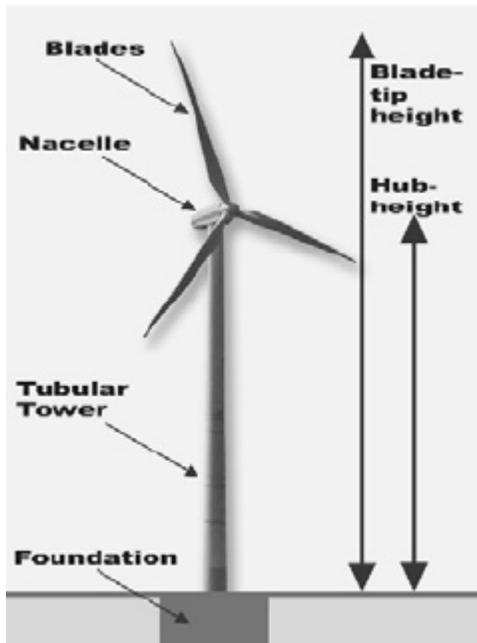
Rotor – A wind Facility's blades and the hub to which they are attached.

Rotor Diameter – The diameter of a wind facilities rotor measured as twice the length of the longest blade plus the hub width (or equal to the diameter of the cylinder).

Wind Facility - All equipment, machinery and structures utilized in connection with wind-generated energy production, generation and sale, including related transmission, distribution, collection, storage or supply systems whether underground, on the surface, or overhead and other equipment or byproducts in connection therewith, including but not limited to, rotor, electrical generator and tower, anemometers (wind measuring equipment), transformers, substation, power lines, control and maintenance facilities, site access and service roads.

Wind Facility, Commercial – A wind facility, which is designed to generally supply less than fifty percent (50%) of its electrical output for use on site.

Wind Facility, Non-Commercial – A wind facility, which is designed to generally supply fifty percent (50%) or more of its electrical output for use on site.



11.6 Wind Energy Facilities Permitting Requirements: The Town of Dennis Zoning Map shall be amended as illustrated in Map 11.1 Wind Facility Overlay District to establish the following overlay districts

Medium Wind Facility Overlay District

11.6.1 ~~RESERVED~~ Residential Scale Wind Facilities

11.6.1.1 Shall be allowed within the R40, R60, RR, LB, EB, DPVC A and DPVC B Zoning Districts subject to the following:

- (a) Residential Scale Wind Facilities shall be a Non-commercial Wind Facility.**
- (b) A Building Permit is granted by the Dennis Building Commissioner.**
- (c) Only Rooftop Wind Facilities shall be allowed.**

(d) Rooftop Wind Facilities shall not extend more than ten feet above the ridgeline of the structure to which it is attached.

(e) No more than one Rooftop Wind Facility shall be constructed on any parcel.

~~11.6.2 Small Scale Wind Facility Overlay District~~

~~Small Scale Wind Facilities shall be allowed on properties illustrated on Map 11-1 subject to the following requirements:~~

~~(a) Small Scale Wind Facilities are considered Non-commercial Wind Facilities serving the needs of a single property or a group of adjoining properties through an association.~~

~~(b) A Special Permit subject to the requirements of Section 11.7 and 11.8 below is granted by the Dennis Planning Board.~~

~~(c) For the purposes of protecting against problems due to noise, collapse of the tower and ice throw, the Small Scale Wind Facilities shall be located:~~

~~(i) at least two times its hub height from its nearest property boundary; and~~

~~(ii) at least 1 times its hub height from any dwelling unit or commercial structure on the site hosting the Small Scale Wind Facility.~~

~~(d) Freestanding Small Scale Wind Facilities shall have a maximum hub height of 40 feet.~~

~~(e) Freestanding Small Scale Wind Facilities shall have a maximum blade tip height of 60 feet.~~

~~(f) Rooftop Small Scale Wind Facilities shall not extend more than ten feet above the ridgeline of the structure to which it is attached.~~

~~(g) Only one (1) wind tower shall be allowed per property.~~

11.6.2 Small Scale Wind Facilities

11.6.2.1 Shall be allowed in the General Commercial I, General Commercial III and Industrial Zoning Districts subject to the following:

- (a) Small Scale Wind Facilities shall be allowed, subject to the following.**
- (b) A Special Permit subject to the requirements of Section 11.7 and 11.8 below is granted by the Dennis Planning Board.**
- (c) For the purposes of protecting against problems due to noise, collapse of the tower, and ice throw the Small Scale Wind Facilities shall be located:**
 - (i) Land Area Requirements:**
 - (1) Small Scale Wind Facilities may be located on any parcel subject to the setback considerations of this subsection;**
 - (ii) Freestanding Small Scale Wind Facilities shall have at least 2 times its hub-height from its nearest property boundary; and**
 - (iii) Freestanding Small Scale Wind Facilities shall have at least 1 times its hub height from any dwelling unit or commercial structure on the site hosting the Wind Facility.**
- (d) Freestanding Small Scale Wind Facilities shall have a maximum hub-height of 40-feet.**
- (e) Freestanding Small Scale Wind Facilities shall have a maximum blade tip height of 60-feet.**
- (g) Only one Freestanding Small Scale Wind Facility may be allowed on any parcel of land.**
- (h) Rooftop Wind Facilities shall not extend more than ten feet above the ridgeline of the structure to which it is attached.**
- (i) No more than two Rooftop Wind Facilities shall be constructed on any parcel.**

11.6.2.2 Shall be allowed in the General Commercial II subject to the following:

- (a) Small Scale Wind Facilities shall be allowed, subject to the following.**
- (b) A Special Permit subject to the requirements of Section 11.7 and 11.8 below is granted by the Dennis Planning Board.**
- (c) Only Rooftop Wind Facilities shall be allowed**
- (h) Rooftop Wind Facilities shall not extend more than ten feet above the ridgeline of the structure to which it is attached.**
- (i) No more than two Rooftop Wind Facilities shall be constructed on any parcel.**

11.6.3 Medium Scale Wind Facilities

11.6.3.2 Medium Scale Wind Facilities shall be allowed within the Industrial District and on the sites illustrated on Map 11-1 subject to the following:

- (a) Medium Wind Facilities may be constructed for the purposes of serving the needs of the site upon which the facility is located, or to generate revenue through the sale of electricity, the revenue from which must serve:
 - (i) a public purpose;**
 - (ii) a commercial agriculture, aquaculture, silviculture, horticulture, floriculture or viticulture land use.****
- (b) A Special Permit subject to the requirements of Sections 11.7 and 11.8 below is granted by the Dennis Planning Board.**
- (d) Medium Scale Wind Facilities located within the Industrial Zoning District shall meet the standards noted in Section 11.6.4 below unless specifically modified below:
 - (i) Land Area Requirements – See Section 11.6.4;****

- (ii) Freestanding Medium Scale Wind Facilities shall have at least 1 times its hub-height from its nearest property boundary except that the Planning Board may determine that a lesser setback is appropriate if the adjacent land is restricted, municipally owned (i.e. Town of Dennis, Dennis Water District, Dennis Housing Authority or Dennis Yarmouth School District) open space and an agreement has been reached between the applicant and the relevant town entity to ensure the safety of the potential setback area, but must be at least 50 feet from any property boundary; and**
- (iv) Freestanding Medium Scale Wind Facilities shall have at least 1 times its hub height from any dwelling unit or occupied structure on the site hosting the Wind Facilities.**
- (e) Medium Scale Wind Facilities located on properties shown on Map 11.1 and located outside the Industrial Zoning District shall meet the standards set forth below:**

 - (i) shall be a parcel of land illustrated on Map 11.1;**
 - (ii) Freestanding Medium Scale Wind Facilities shall have at least two times its hub-height from its nearest property boundary except that the Planning Board may determine that a lesser setback is appropriate if the adjacent land is restricted, municipally owned (i.e. Town of Dennis, Dennis Water District, Dennis Housing Authority or Dennis Yarmouth School District) open space and an agreement has been reached between the applicant and the relevant town entity to ensure the safety of the potential setback area, but must be at least 50 feet from any property boundary; and**
 - (iii) Freestanding Medium Scale Wind Facilities shall have at least 1 times its hub height from any dwelling unit or occupied structure on the site hosting the Wind Facility.**

- (f) *Freestanding Medium Scale Wind Facilities shall:***
 - (i) *have a maximum hub height of 80 feet.***
 - (ii) *have a maximum blade tip height of 120 feet.***
- (g) *Rooftop Medium Scale Wind Facilities shall not extend more than ten feet above the ridgeline of the structure to which it is attached.***
- (h) *When more than one Medium Scale Wind Facility is located on a property a minimum spacing equal to two times the widest dimension will be required between wind structures.***

11.6.34 ~~Medium and Large Scale Wind Facilities Overlay District~~

~~Medium and Large Scale Wind Facilities shall be allowed in the Industrial Zoning District on properties illustrated on Map 11-1 and~~ subject to the following restrictions:

- (a) ~~Medium and Large Scale Wind Facilities~~ may be permitted as Non-commercial Wind Facilities when serving the needs of single property or may be permitted as Commercial Wind Facilities.**
- (b) A Special Permit subject to the requirements of Sections 11.7 and 11.8 below is granted by the Dennis Planning Board.**
- (c) For the purposes of protecting against problems due to noise, collapse of the tower and ice throw, the ~~Medium and Large Scale Wind Facilities~~ shall be located:**
 - (i) on a tract of land (a parcel or contiguous parcels under common ownership) that contains a minimum of ten (10) acres;**
 - (ii) at least 1-5 times its hub-height from its nearest property boundary; and**

- (iii) at least 1 times its hub height from any dwelling unit or commercial structure on the site hosting the Medium and Large Scale Wind Facility.
- (d) Freestanding ~~Medium and~~ Large Scale Wind Facilities shall have a maximum hub-height of 215-feet.
- (e) Freestanding ~~Medium and~~ Large Scale Wind Facilities shall have a maximum blade tip height of 350 feet.
- (f) Rooftop ~~Medium and~~ Large Scale Wind Facilities shall not extend more than ten feet above the ridgeline of the structure to which it is attached.
- (g) When more than one ~~Medium or~~ Large Scale Wind Facility is located on a property a minimum spacing equal to two times the rotor diameter will be required between wind structures.

11.7 General Requirements for the Installation of any Wind Facility.

- 11.7.1 The safety of the design and construction of any Wind Facility, including towers and associated equipment, shall be certified by the manufacturer or by an Engineer Licensed by the State of Massachusetts.
- 11.7.2 Safety wires shall be installed on the turnbuckles on guy wires of guyed wind facility towers.
- 11.7.3 All wind facilities shall be equipped with manual and automatic cut-out wind speed controls. The rotor and cut-out wind speed control shall be certified by the manufacturer or by an Engineer Licensed by the State of Massachusetts.
- 11.7.4 The compatibility of the tower structure with the rotors and other components of the wind facility shall be certified by the manufacturer or by an Engineer Licensed by the State of Massachusetts.
- 11.7.5 All towers or wind facilities shall either have tower climbing apparatus located not closer than twelve (12)

feet to the ground or be un-climbable by design for the first twelve (12) feet.

- 11.7.6 Wind facilities sited on top of, or attached to and extending above the ridge line of, an existing structure shall comply with all applicable provisions of the latest version of the Uniform Building Code. Certification by an Engineer Licensed by the State of Massachusetts shall be required.
- 11.7.7 The owner/applicant of any wind facility shall provide, as part of the submissions for review by the Planning Board for a Special Permit, proof of liability insurance that specifically addresses the installation, use and maintenance of the wind facility.
- 11.7.8 Any equipment associated with the facility, shall be camouflaged or screened. Buildings, shall be surrounded by buffers of dense tree growth and understory vegetation in all directions to create an effective year-round visual buffer. Trees and vegetation may be existing on the property or installed as part of the proposed facility or a combination of both. The Planning Board shall approve the types of trees and plant materials and depth of the needed buffer based on site conditions. Equipment shelters for wind facilities shall be designed to be consistent with the traditional Cape Cod architecture and the surrounding neighborhood.
- 11.7.9 All utility connections from the wind facility to the existing grid shall be underground.
- 11.7.10 Clearing of natural vegetation shall be limited to that which is necessary for the construction, operation and maintenance of the wind facility.
- 11.7.11 Night lighting shall be prohibited unless required by state or federal law and shall be the minimum necessary. There shall be total cutoff of all light at the property lines of the parcel to be developed, and footcandle measurements at the property line shall be 0.0 initial footcandles when measured at grade.

- 11.7.12 Wind Facilities shall be painted a neutral, non-reflective color designed to blend with the surrounding environment.
- 11.7.13 Removal. The owner, or their successors in interest shall remove any wind facility the use of which has been discontinued for a period of twelve months. All wind facilities and appurtenant structures shall also be removed. If an owner fails to remove a wind facility in accordance with this section of this Bylaw, the town shall have the authority to enter the subject property and physically remove the facility. The Board shall require the applicant to post a bond at the time of construction to cover costs for the removal of the wind facility in the event the Town must remove the facility. The value of the bond shall be based upon the ability to meet all of the requirements noted in this section at prevailing wages. The value of the bond shall be developed based upon the applicant providing the Planning Board with three (3) written bids to meet the requirements of this section. An incentive factor of 1.5 shall be applied to all bonds to ensure compliance and adequate funds for the town to remove the tower at prevailing wages.
- 11.7.14 Each wind facility shall be operated and maintained in sound working order in conformance with the manufacturer's specifications at all times. This maintenance shall include the physical appearance of the devices so that it does not present an unsightly appearance. A copy of the manufacturer's specifications and use instructions shall be submitted with any application for review by the Building Commissioner file for that application.
- 11.7.15 Minimum Rotor Wind Blade Clearance. The lowest point of the arc created by rotating wind blades on a **freestanding** wind turbine generator shall be no less than 25 feet above grade.
- 11.8 Criteria for review and approval of a Special Permit for a Wind Energy Facility.

- 11.8.1 A special permit shall be granted under this section if the SPGA finds that each of the design standards set forth above has been met and that the location of the wind facility is suitable and that the size, height and design are the minimum necessary for that purpose
- 11.8.2 The SPGA shall also impose, in addition to any applicable conditions specified in this section, such conditions as it finds reasonably appropriate to safeguard the neighborhood or otherwise serve the purposes of this section, including, but not limited to: screening, lighting, fences, modification of the exterior appearance of the structures, limitation upon size, method of access or traffic features, parking, removal upon cessation of use or other requirements. Such conditions shall be imposed in writing and the applicant may be required to post bond or other surety for compliance with said conditions in an amount satisfactory to the SPGA.
- 11.8.3 RESERVED
- 11.8.4 The SPGA may require the proponent to provide or pay for professional services for the SPGA to evaluate the proposal to determine the suitability of geographic location, to analyze the loading capacities of the proposed structures, and to review camouflage and screening techniques.
- 11.8.5 Removal. The owner, his successors in interest shall remove any wind facility the use of which has been discontinued. All wind facilities and appurtenant structures shall also be removed. If an owner fails to remove a wind facility in accordance with this section of this Bylaw, the town shall have the authority to enter the subject property and physically remove the facility. The Board shall require the applicant to post a bond at the time of construction to cover costs for the removal of the wind facility in the event the Town must remove the facility. The value of the bond shall be based upon the ability to meet all of the requirements noted in this section at prevailing wages. The value of the bond shall be developed based upon the applicant providing the Planning Board with three

(3) written bids to meet the requirements of this section. An incentive factor of 1.5 shall be applied to all bonds to ensure compliance and adequate funds for the town to remove the tower at prevailing wages. Municipally owned wind facilities shall be exempt from the surety requirement.

11.8.6 Each wind facility shall be operated and maintained in sound working order in conformance with the manufacturer's specifications at all times. This maintenance shall include the physical appearance of the devices so that it does not present an unsightly appearance. A copy of the manufacturer's specifications and use instructions shall be submitted with any application for review by the Planning Board file for that application.

11.8.7 The Planning Board may impose Conditions of Approval that are necessary to address health, safety, community welfare and community aesthetic issues or concerns raised during the Development Permit review.

11.8.8 RESERVED

11.8.9 There shall be a minimum of one parking space to be used in connection with the maintenance of any Medium, Municipal or Large Scale Wind Facility on the site; however, it shall not to be used for the permanent storage of vehicles.

11.8.10 Fencing shall be provided to control access to the site of the wind facility and accessory structures.

11.8.11 Signs. There shall be no signs, except no trespassing signs or any signs required to warn of danger. A sign is required that identifies the owner and operator with an emergency telephone number where the owner and operator can be reached on a twenty-four hour basis.

11.9 Application for Special Permit. In addition to the requirements of Section 4.1 of the Zoning By-law the following information must be submitted for all Wind Energy Facilities for an application to be considered complete:

11.9.1 A locus plan or aerial photograph at a scale of 1" = 200' which shall show all property lines, the exact location of the proposed structure(s), street landscape features,

dwellings and other structures within three times the blade-tip height of the proposed wind facility.

11.9.2 A site reference plan at 1"=20 feet which shall show the location of the proposed structures, site facilities, landscaping etc.

11.9.3 A color photograph or rendition of the wind facility. A rendition shall also be prepared illustrating a view of the wind facility from the nearest street(s).

11.9.4 The following information must be prepared and signed by a registered professional engineer qualified in the field of wind power:

- (a) A description of the wind facility and the technical, economic and other reasons for the proposed location, height and design.
- (b) Certification that the wind facility complies with all applicable Federal and State standards.
- (c) If applicable, a written statement that the proposed wind facility complies with, or is exempt from applicable regulations administered by the Federal Aviation Administration (FAA), Massachusetts Aeronautics Commission and the Massachusetts Department of Public Health.

11.10 Nothing in this by-law should be read to regulate the provision of wind facilities for an agriculture, aquaculture, silviculture, horticulture, floriculture or viticulture land use the primary purpose of such wind facility is to meet the needs of said land use on parcels of 5 acres or more as defined in Chapter 40A Section 3.

(d) amend the Town of Dennis Zoning Map on file in the Office of the Town Clerk and the Planning Office to delete the "Small Wind Facility Overlay District" and the "Medium and Large Wind Facility Overlay District" and to add the "Medium Wind Facility Overlay District"

ARTICLE 38: Unanimously Voted: To (a) amend the Dennis Zoning By-law Section 2.2.2 Use Regulation Schedule to add Subsection 2.2.2.7.i Commercial Scale Solar Energy Electrical Generator; (b) amend Subsection 2.2.2.8.f Non-Commercial Scale Solar Energy Electrical Generator; and (c) amend Section 5 Definitions to add the noted definitions in the appropriate locations.

Purpose of the Amendment. The Town of Dennis finds that it is necessary for the protection of the public health, safety and welfare to protect Residential Zoning Districts from the potential incursion of non-residential, industrial type uses, from intrusion into residential zoning districts. As such, the town proposes to establish a threshold upon which a Solar Energy Electrical Generator would be considered as a commercial use as opposed to an accessory use. Consistent with Chapter 40A Section 3 Non-Commercial Scale Solar Energy Electrical Generators will be allowed in any zoning district as accessory uses. Also, consistent with the stated need in Chapter 40A Section 3, to protect the public health, safety and welfare, Commercial Scale Solar Energy Electrical Generators, as defined in this Zoning By-law, will be restricted to specified Commercial Zoning Districts.

Biodiesel Blending Facility means a facility which blends materials to create a diesel fuel substitute consisting of methyl or ethyl esters produced from the transesterification of animal or vegetable fats with methanol or ethanol. Biodiesel or biodiesel blends must contain at least 20% biodiesel. A biodiesel blending facility may also process associated by-products into useable items for market.

Fuel Cell Energy Manufacturing Facility means a site which produces 1 or more fuel cells or fuel cell stacks, inverters or

other power conditioning units for use in fuel cell energy systems. Fuel cell energy manufacturing shall include fuel processors for converting fuel for use in a fuel cell.

Fuel cell means an electrochemical device that uses an external fuel and continuously converts the energy released from the oxidation of fuel by oxygen directly into electricity without combustion and consists of an anode, a cathode, and an electrolyte.

Fuel cell stack means an assembly of fuel cells.

Fuel processor means a device that converts a fuel, including, but not limited to, methanol, natural gas, or gasoline, into a hydrogen rich gas, without combustion for use in a fuel cell. Geothermal Energy Manufacturing Facility means a facility that manufactures systems designed for the collection of absorbed heat derived from underground, in the atmosphere and oceans.

Photovoltaic Energy System Manufacturing Facility means a site which produces a solar energy device composed of 1 or more photovoltaic cells or photovoltaic modules and an inverter or other power conditioning unit. A Photovoltaic Energy System Manufacturing Facility may also produce batteries for power storage or an electricity storage device.

Photovoltaic cell means an integrated device consisting of layers of semiconductor materials and electrical contacts capable of converting incident light directly into electricity.

Photovoltaic module means an assembly of photovoltaic cells.

Renewable Energy Manufacturing Facility shall mean a business engaged in the research, development, or manufacturing of biodiesel, photovoltaic, solar-thermal, geothermal, fuel cell and wind energy systems

Solar Thermal Energy System Manufacturing Facility means a facility involved in the production of the components for an

integrated unit consisting of a sunlight collection device, a system containing a heat transfer fluid to receive the collected sunlight, and heat exchangers to transfer the solar energy to a thermal storage tank to heat or cool spaces or water or to generate electricity.

Wind Energy System Manufacturing Facility means a facility involved in the production of the components for wind turbines including the production of rotors, electrical generators, control systems, inverters or other power conditioning units, towers, and blades which uses moving air to produce power.

ARTICLE 40: Majority Voted: To amend the first sentence of Article V11, §36-8.1, the so-called Fee Limitation By-Law, to exempt all Golf Fees with the exception of Golf Membership fees from its application, so that, as amended, the section will read as follows:

“Notwithstanding any by-law to the contrary, no public facility user fee license or permit fee or charge which is authorized by by-law or which may be authorized by by-law to be set by the Selectmen, excluding all Golf Fees with the exception of Golf Membership fees, shall be valid or collected for a fee of one hundred dollars (\$100.00) or more if an increase in such fee in any calendar year exceeds an amount greater than five percent (5%) of the amount effective the previous calendar year, and for a fee of less than one hundred dollars (\$100.00) if an increase in such fee in any calendar year exceeds an amount greater than fifteen percent (15%) of the amount effective the previous calendar year, unless, in either event, such amount is set by vote of a Dennis Town Meeting.”

ARTICLE 41: Unanimously Voted: To amend Chapter 1, §1-3 (Noncriminal Disposition) of the Town Code, by deleting the wording in its entirety and replacing it with the following:

“§1-3 Fine.

For the purpose of this section, each violation of a by-law, rule or regulation shall be punished by a fine as

provided therein, which shall not exceed three hundred dollars (\$300.00). Each day that such violation continues shall constitute a separate offense.”

ARTICLE 42: Unanimously Voted: To adopt the following new “PUBLIC CONSUMPTION OF MARIJUANA OR TETRAHYDROCANNABINOL BY-LAW” and to amend the Town Code by adding to it a new Chapter 49 as follows:

“PUBLIC CONSUMPTION OF MARIJUANA OR TETRAHYDROCANNABINOL

49-1 Prohibited Activity

No person shall smoke, ingest, or otherwise use or consume marijuana or tetrahydrocannabinol (as defined in G.L. c.94C Section 1, as amended) while in or upon any street, sidewalk, public way, footway, passageway, stairs, bridge, park, playground, beach, recreation area, boat landing, public building, schoolhouse, school grounds, cemetery, parking lot or any area owned by or under the control of the Town; or in or upon any bus or other passenger conveyance operated by a common carrier; or in any place accessible to the public.

49-2 Identification Required

Any person smoking, ingesting or otherwise using or consuming marijuana or tetrahydrocannabinol in violation of Section 1 of this by-law shall provide to a police officer so requesting personal identifying information, including their full legal name and address. Failure to provide such identifying information upon request, or provision of false, incorrect or otherwise invalid identifying information, shall be considered a separate violation of this by-law.

49-3 Violations and Penalties

This By-Law may be enforced through any lawful means in law or in equity including, but not limited to, enforcement by criminal indictment or complaint pursuant to G.L. c.40, Section 21 or by noncriminal disposition pursuant to G.L. c.40, Section 21D, by those persons authorized under Section 1-2 of the Town Code, to include members of the Harbormaster’s Office. The fine for

violation of this by-law shall be \$100.00 for the first offense, \$200.00 for a second offense and \$300.00 for a third or subsequent offense. Any penalty imposed under this by-law shall be in addition to any civil penalty imposed under G.L. c.94C, Section 32L.

And further, that non-substantive changes to the number of this by-law be permitted in order that it be in compliance with the numbering format of the Code of the Town of Dennis.

ARTICLE 43: Unanimously Voted: To authorize the Board of Selectmen to seek special legislation to allow the Town Treasurer to borrow in anticipation of reimbursements from betterments assessed in connection with work performed on private ways open to and used by the general public, as provided for in the Town's Temporary Repairs on Private Ways By-law under Chapter 156, Article II, of the Town Code, and further, once said legislation is approved, to amend Chapter 156 to include this borrowing authorization.

ARTICLE 44: Unanimously Voted: To borrow \$205,000 to make temporary repairs to roads open to and used by the general public within the Wrinkle Point Association (which includes Davenport Road, Garfield Lane, Porter Lane, Thirza's Way and portions of Uncle Barney's Road and Buckley Road) in West Dennis, pursuant to the provisions of MGL c.80 and the Town of Dennis "Temporary Repairs on Private Ways By-Law" adopted at the May 3, 2005 Annual Town Meeting under Article 31, and in accordance with the vote of the Board of Selectmen on February 24, 2009, declaring that the repairs to said private ways are required because of public necessity and convenience, and the owners of said land benefited by said temporary repairs shall be assessed their proportionate share of betterments, in accordance with Chapter 117 of the Acts of 1997 (Town of Dennis Betterment Assessment and Fund Act).

ARTICLE 45: Unanimously Voted: To authorize the Board of Selectmen to seek special legislation that will allow the Dennis Water District to assume the responsibilities for sewer and wastewater subject to the provisions of Massachusetts General Laws, Chapter 59, Section 21C, commonly known as Proposition 2

1/2, as amended, and as defined in Massachusetts General Laws, Chapter 83, as amended.

ARTICLE 46: Majority Vote: To accept the provisions of M.G.L. Chapter 32B, Section 9D, to provide for the Town payment of one-half of the premium costs payable by the surviving spouse of an employee or retired employee for group general or blanket hospital, surgical, medical, dental or other health insurance.

ARTICLE 47: Unanimously Voted: To accept M.G.L Chapter 32B, Section 18A which requires that all retirees, who retire after the acceptance of this section, their spouses and dependents who are enrolled in Medicare Part A at no cost to a retiree, their spouse or dependents, or eligible for coverage there under at no cost to a retiree, his spouse or dependents, be required to enroll in a Medicare health benefits supplement plan offered by the Town.

ARTICLE 48: Majority Vote: To transfer \$10,000 from Free Cash for planning and engineering of Gages Way in South Dennis.

ARTICLE 49: Unanimously Voted: To transfer the remaining balance of \$37,496.14 from Article 10 of the September 21, 2004 Special Town Meeting, that was appropriated for the acquisition and demolition costs associated with Sea View Park in Dennisport, and reallocate said funds to pay for the construction and related costs of said Park.

ARTICLE 50: Unanimously Voted: To transfer \$250,000 from Free Cash for the purpose of reducing the tax rate for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 2009.

It was unanimously voted to adjourn (dissolve) the meeting at 10:33 p.m. on May 5, 2009.

SPECIAL TOWN MEETING

OCTOBER 27, 2009

Robert C. Chamberlain, Moderator, called the Special Town meeting held at the Nathaniel H. Wixon Middle School to order at 7:00 p.m. He declared a quorum present and noted that the Warrant had been posted by George Sawyer, Constable. Tellers were Gladys Kearney, Robert Duffy, Thomas Perrino and Paul Covell, Head Teller.

On motion of Finance Committee Chairman, James Plath, duly seconded, it was unanimously voted to waive the formal reading of the Warrant.

Moderator Chamberlain asked the assembly to kindly rise and salute the flag.

ARTICLE 1: Unanimously Voted: To accept Section 40 of Chapter 653 of the Acts of 1989 which amends M.G.L. Chapter 59, Section 2A(a), and authorizes the Town to assess new buildings, structures, or other physical improvements added to real property between January second and June thirtieth for the fiscal year beginning on July first. As a result, new construction or improvements building on the parcel during the first six months of the year will now be reflected in the assessed valuation of the parcel a fiscal year earlier; however, the statute does not change the January first assessment date, and the taxable unit, ownership and value of real estate parcels will still be determined as of January first. The assessment of personal property is not effected by this legislation and mortgages upon buildings or other things, which the land upon which they are erected or to which they are affixed are taxable as real estate defined in the statute, shall be deemed mortgages of real estate for the purpose of taxation, and shall be taxed under Section Eleven to Twelve B, of Chapter 59, inclusive.

ARTICLE 2: Majority Vote: To appropriate and transfer \$100,000 from the Community Preservation Historic Preservation Reserves

Fund and appropriate and transfer \$408,074 from the Community Preservation Undesignated Reserves Fund to the Town of Dennis for continued historic preservation of the Rev. Josiah Dennis Manse Museum.

ARTICLE 3: Voted 165 yes to 6 no: To authorize the Treasurer, with the approval of the Board of Selectmen to borrow \$1,800,000 in anticipation of revenue under the Community Preservation Act, M.G.L. Chapter 44B, Section 11, and pursuant to M.G.L Chapter 44, Section 7, Paragraph (3A), or any other enabling authority, for the continued historic preservation of the Rev. Josiah Dennis Manse Museum.

ARTICLE 4: Unanimously Voted: To appropriate and transfer \$30,000 from the Community Preservation Historic Preservation Reserves Fund to the Dennis Historical Society under a grant agreement for historical archives of documents and artifacts.

ARTICLE 5: Voted by Majority: To appropriate and transfer \$51,450 from the Community Preservation Open Space and Recreation Reserves Fund to the Town of Dennis for the continued site development of the Bass River Park, West Dennis.

ARTICLE 6: Unanimously Voted: To transfer \$33,396.50 from the May 5, 2009 Annuyal Town Meeting, under Article 4, Line Item #5, Town Administrator Settlements to fund the provisions of a collective bargaining agreement between the Town and the Dennis Police Sergeants IBPO Local 579 for Fiscal Year 2010.

ARTICLE 7: Unanimously Voted: To amend the Town Code by adding to it the following new Stormwater Management By-Law and further, that non-substantive changes to the numbering of this by-law be permitted in order that it be in compliance with the numbering format of the Code of the Town of Dennis:

“STORMWATER MANAGEMENT BY-LAW”

IT IS HEREBY DETERMINED THAT:

Construction Site stormwater runoff and post-construction stormwater discharges may permanently alter the hydrologic response of local watersheds and increase stormwater runoff rates and volumes, which in turn may increase flooding, stream channel erosion, non-point source pollution, sediment transport and deposition, and decrease groundwater recharge;

Construction Site stormwater runoff and post-construction stormwater discharges can adversely affect public safety, public and private property, surface water, groundwater resources, drinking water supplies, recreation, aquatic habitats, fish and other aquatic life, property values and other uses of land and water.

It is in the public interest to regulate Construction Site stormwater runoff and post-construction stormwater discharges in order to minimize the impacts identified above.

1. PURPOSE

- A) The purpose of this By-law is to manage land development in order to protect, maintain and enhance the public health, safety, environment and general welfare by establishing minimum requirements and procedures to control the adverse impacts of construction site stormwater runoff and post-construction stormwater discharges. This Bylaw seeks to meet this purpose through the following objectives:
- 1) Establish decision-making processes surrounding Construction Site activities that protect the integrity of the watershed and preserve the health of water resources;
 - 2) Require that Construction Site activities maintain the post-construction runoff characteristics as equal to or less than the pre-construction runoff characteristics;

- 3) Establish minimum Construction Site and post-construction stormwater management standards and design criteria for the regulation and control of stormwater runoff quantity and quality;
 - 4) Encourage the use of nonstructural stormwater management practices or “low-impact development” practices; i.e. grass swales, french drains, etc.;
 - 5) Establish provisions for the long-term responsibility for and maintenance of structural stormwater control facilities and nonstructural stormwater management practices to ensure that they continue to function as designed, are maintained, and pose no threat to public safety;
 - 6) Establish provisions to ensure there is an adequate funding mechanism, including surety, for the proper review, inspection and long-term maintenance of stormwater facilities implemented as part of this By-law; and,
 - 7) Establish administrative procedures, fees and fines for violations for the submission, review, approval or disapproval of applications for stormwater management permits, and for the inspection of approved active projects, and long-term follow up.
- B) Nothing in this By-law is intended to replace the requirements of the Town of Dennis Wetlands Protection Bylaw, Zoning By-law, Subdivision Rules & Regulations, Board Of Health Regulations or any other By-law that may be adopted by the Town of Dennis, or any State or Federal requirement, law, regulation or policy. Any activity subject to the provisions of this By-law must comply with all other applicable Town, State or Federal requirements.

2. DEFINITIONS

The following definitions shall apply in the interpretation and implementation of this By-law. Additional definitions may be adopted by separate regulation:

ADVERSE IMPACT: Having a deleterious effect on waters or wetlands, including their quality, quantity, surface area, species composition, aesthetics or usefulness for human or natural uses which are or may potentially be harmful or injurious to human health, welfare, safety or property, to biological productivity, diversity, or stability or which unreasonably interfere with the enjoyment of life or property, including outdoor recreation.

ALTERATION: Any activity, which will change the ability of a ground surface area to absorb water or will change existing surface drainage patterns. Examples include, but are not limited to, earthmoving, paving, and modification of existing vegetation.

BUILDING COMMISSIONER: Means the Town of Dennis Building Commissioner or his/her designee.

CONSTRUCTION SITE: Any site where activity is proposed or occurs that involves the alteration of more than five hundred (500) contiguous square feet of land.

HOTSPOT AREA: Land uses or activities, without regard to square footage, that have the potential for high stormwater runoff pollutant loadings, including, but not limited to, auto fueling facilities, fleet storage yards, road salt storage areas and designated snow disposal areas, staging areas for construction or landscaping operations, commercial and industrial outdoor maintenance, storage or loading areas.

PERSON: An individual, partnership, association, firm, company, trust, corporation, agency, authority, department or political subdivision of the Commonwealth or the Federal government, to the extent permitted by law, and any officer, employee or agent of such person.

STORMWATER MANAGEMENT PERMIT: A document signed by the Town of Dennis Building Commissioner which allows the alteration of the land within a Hotspot Area or Construction Site based upon the person's proposed work on a project plan which was submitted as required by this Stormwater Management By-law.

3. AUTHORITY

This By-law is adopted under authority granted by the Home Rule Amendment of the Massachusetts Constitution, the Home Rule statutes, and pursuant to the regulations of the federal Clean Water Act found at 40 CFR 122.34, and as authorized by the voters of the Town of Dennis at the October 27, 2009 Special Town Meeting under Article 7.

4. ADMINISTRATION

- A) The Town of Dennis Board of Selectmen shall adopt, and may periodically amend, rules and regulations relating to the terms, conditions, definitions, enforcement, fees (including application, inspection, and/or consultant fees), fines and penalties, application requirements, procedures and administration of this Stormwater Management Bylaw, after conducting a public hearing to receive comments on any proposed rules and regulations, or revisions thereto. Failure by the Town of Dennis Board of Selectmen to promulgate such rules and regulations, or a legal declaration of their invalidity by a court, shall not act to suspend or invalidate the effect of this By-law.

- B) The Building Commissioner shall administer, implement and enforce this By-law. Any powers granted to or duties imposed upon the Building Commissioner may be delegated by the Building Commissioner to his/her designee.

- C) The Building Commissioner may take any of the following actions as a result of an application for a Storm Water Management Permit: Approval, Approval with Conditions, Disapproval, or Disapproval without Prejudice.

5. APPLICABILITY

- A) All persons that create a Construction Site or Hotspot Area are required to satisfy the purpose and intent of this By-law and in accordance with the "Dennis Stormwater Management Rules and Regulations", as revised.

- B) In addition, all construction sites altering more than 20,000 square feet of total area, and all Hotspot areas are required to secure a Stormwater Management Permit prior to starting any land disturbance within the person's property.
- C) The following exemptions from this Stormwater Management By-law apply:
 - 1) Any land disturbance 500 square feet or less.
 - 2) Normal maintenance and improvement of land in agricultural use as defined by the Wetlands Protection Act regulation 310 CMR 10.04;
 - 3) Emergency activities necessary to protect public health or safety, so long as all necessary emergency permits or emergency certifications have been or will be obtained;
 - 4) Normal maintenance and improvements of Town of Dennis Publicly Owned Roads.
 - 5) Any work or projects for which all necessary approvals and permits have been issued before the effective date of this By-law.

6. ENFORCEMENT

- A) This By-law shall be administered by the Building Commissioner. The Building Commissioner shall approve no application of any kind nor drawings or specifications which are not in all respects in conformance with this By-law.
- B) The Building Commissioner shall be under the supervision of the Board of Selectmen and shall be subject to such administrative procedures as it may prescribe for the proper conduct of this office. The Building Commissioner shall submit an annual report in January of each year of the work of his office.
- C) The Building Commissioner shall make inspections of all sites covered under this By-law within the Town and may, for these

purposes, enter upon the premises where such operations are carried on at all reasonable times.

D) Violations and Penalties.

- 1) Any person, corporation or entity found in violation of any provisions of this Bylaw shall be punished by a fine in accordance with the following schedule of fines, and each day that the violation continues shall constitute a separate offense:

- 2) Notice of violation and procedure shall be in accordance with M.G.L.A. C.40, para.21D (Non-criminal disposition).

7. SEVERABILITY

The invalidity of any section, provision, paragraph, sentence or clause of this By-law shall not invalidate any section, provision, paragraph, sentence, or clause thereof, nor shall it invalidate any permit or determination that previously has been issued.

BOARD OF ASSESSORS

At the Special Town Meeting in November 2008, the Town of Dennis voted to return to quarterly tax billing. Beginning in July 2009, preliminary tax bills were issued to taxpayers; with actual tax bills being sent in December 2009.

Most property values for Fiscal Year 2010 reflected the overall weak housing market and declined in all but the most desirable areas. The overall assessed valuation of the Town declined by 4.2%. The average assessment for a single family home in Dennis for FY 2010 is \$423,534. For FY 2010, the average single family tax bill is \$2,232.02.

Fiscal Year 2010 is an interim valuation year for the Town of Dennis. Property values reflect 100% Full and Fair Cash Value as of January 1, 2009. The tax rate of \$5.27 was approved by the Department of Revenue on November 25. Property assessments can be viewed on-line at www.town.dennis.ma.us.

A new Assistant Treasurer/Collector has joined the office of the Treasurer/Collector: Rosemary Moriarty. Rosemary brings financial experience to the town in the areas of cash receipts, accounting, payroll, and staff management. In addition to Rosemary, the staff in the office, Accounts/Records Clerks Janet Majka, Tone Raneo, and Lynn Bigelow continue to provide a unique level of professionalism to the residents of the town.

Tax bills can be paid on-line through the use of our town website, just follow the link to the Unipay system. Personal Property taxes are assessed as of January 1st. For FY 2010, the owner of record January 1st, 2009 would be responsible for the full amount levied on the FY 2010 Personal Property tax bill; unlike real estate, this tax cannot be pro-rated when a property is sold.

The Town has gone out to bid for its banking services, and plans are in place to consolidate many of its existing bank accounts which are no longer desirable; this is mainly due to declining rates of return or their current Veribanc rating.

In the coming year, we will continue in our efforts to increase collections of town receivables, manage all town funds in a way that will safely maximize its return on investment, and accelerate our efforts for the collection of all tax title accounts. We will also strive to have important information posted to our website, which is www.town.dennis.ma.us.

Police Department

It has been a year of change at the Dennis Police Department as we said goodbye to retiring officers – Sergeant Paul Baltrushunas and Detective Robert Kurisko – and welcomed officers Andrew Viall, Matthew Swett and Thomas Murray. Sadly, we lost our Records Clerk – Lynn Garland to a tragic car crash, but welcomed our new Records Clerk – Marybeth Dilauro in June. We also lost a good friend in retired officer Thomas “Santa” Martin, but his legacy will remain thanks to the naming of the “Thomas F. Martin Community Room”. Through these changes and more expected during 2010 the staff, both sworn and civilian, continues to provide a high level of service to you, our customers. I assure you we will continue to give our best efforts to meet your needs during the years ahead.

Fiscal challenges remain as we continue to forge through this difficult period. At the 2009 Special Town Meeting the Department took a \$227,000.00 reduction to the payroll budget and despite considerable decreases in pay for sworn personnel, officers continued to provide the high service level that this community has come to expect. These cuts and others – totaling over \$250,000.00 are the result of the Commonwealth’s continued decrease in local law enforcement support. We continue to look for revenue sources outside of the general fund. This year we applied for and received almost \$100,000.00 in various grant funding and continue to seek the forfeiture of drug assets from those citizens violating state and federal drug laws.

We are also participating in many regional projects as a way to provide services at lower costs. Fleet purchases continue to be made through the Plymouth County regional bid program and the Cape Cod Regional Law Enforcement Council allows the 16 police departments of the Cape and Islands to assist each other with training, mutual aid and other police response activities. We have entered into an information sharing agreement with Barnstable and Yarmouth that provides the 3 departments with weekly crime analysis bulletins. Information must flow freely across town lines since the criminal elements we deal with do the same. We are also

participating in a regional sheltering project through the Barnstable County Regional Emergency Planning Committee. This project resulted in the successful opening of a regional shelter at the DY High School that provides all shelter services including the ability to shelter domestic pets. Similar shelters will open throughout the year and we expect to have a comprehensive regional shelter program, across the Cape, completely operational by 2011.

We continue to strive to provide the highest levels of service possible within the confines of the current fiscal constraints and I welcome your comments if you do not believe you have received the appropriate level of service. I also welcome your comments concerning those staff members who have excelled in assisting you. As we start a new decade I wish you all a safe and healthy 2010.

Dennis Animal Control

I hereby respectfully submit the Annual Report of the Animal Control Officer for the year 2009.

The role of Animal Control in the community is to protect the public from dangerous or diseased animals and to protect animals from abuse and suffering caused by humans, to promote a safe and peaceable coexistence between animals, animal owners, and the rest of the community. One important task of this department is to educate pet owners on the need to properly confine, vaccinate, and spay or neuter their pets. Emphasis is placed on spaying and neutering cats as well as dogs, and putting identification on cats that are allowed to roam free, either with an ID tag on a collar or with a microchip. It is rare for a cat that wears identification to come into contact with Animal Control because concerned citizens can directly contact the owner from the tag on the cat's collar. Cars, coyotes and other causes resulted in serious injury to 11 cats, and the death of 27 cats this year.

Investigating reports of animal bites, injured animals, or possible neglect or cruelty are a priority for Animal Control, as well as promptly responding to complaints regarding dogs barking, roaming free, and animals behaving aggressively. Animal Control is available to civic groups for informational talks on many animal related topics, and we do our best to answer the public's questions, offers solutions to many animal related problems. Owners with dogs that are exhibiting behavior problems can call for information on local trainers that offer behavior counseling and obedience training or equipment suggestions. I would like to thank those people whose responsible pet ownership helps to keep their pets and community safe and happy, and continue to offer some expertise to those who need a little help becoming a better pet owner and perhaps a better neighbor.

Fire Department

The Dennis Fire Department takes pride in serving the five villages comprising our Town and our neighbors, on request, for Fire and Advanced Life Support. I'm pleased to report that our organizational effectiveness during 2009 has been exemplary even considering the very difficult financial times that faced us. Our firefighters are very active and involved in our community with several health and safety initiatives as well as programs that add to our general quality of life. Some examples of those activities in 2009 have been CPR and First Aid classes through the Community Heart Safe program, providing AED's and training for the Towns residents and departments, including the Dennis Senior Center and the Tony Kent Arena, the Car Seat Safety Installation program and the Bike Helmet & Home Fire safety program. We work with the Andrea Holden Fund in the Kid Safe program to provide information and interactive involvement with children with dangers around the home. Our members also provide Free Blood pressure screening at both our Town Fire Stations.

Due to the economic decline nationally and locally, many communities, including Dennis, have been forced into reviewing our methods of operations to curtail costs. One such review and subsequent change, approved in February 2009 by the Board of Selectmen and targeted for a September implementation, was the change to County Fire Dispatch from the longstanding dispatching at Fire Headquarters. While the actual changeover did not take effect until November, this major change within the Fire Department operation was very difficult for many people to accept. The changeover was enacted to save fire department overtime and at years end, was accomplishing that goal. The conversion itself went relatively smooth. The cooperation between the various vendors, Barnstable County Sheriff, Dennis Fire Department and the Dennis Police Department over the many months through the spring and summer were good. Of particular note in this report, was the cooperation of the Dennis Firefighters in the conversion process, as they, as an organization, were strongly opposed to the move. This speaks volumes to the professionalism of our firefighters.

Dennis Fire responded to a total of 4,471 incidents in 2009, continuing to make Dennis Fire the fourth busiest fire department on Cape Cod, right behind Falmouth. Our members constantly receive positive feedback from the community for the service they perform on a daily basis.

I would like to extend my sincere thanks to our personnel in helping to maintain and improve the quality of our organization. I also wish to thank the other Town employees and Departments that we work with every day for their cooperation, our Towns Boards and Commissions, the public to which we serve and for the support of the Dennis Board of Selectmen who represent our residents and business community.

FIRE PREVENTION

Fire prevention inspections were conducted in a wide variety of occupancies over the past year. The Fire Prevention Office conducted 1,351 various activities in its daily interaction with the public and business community. Night club evening inspections were also conducted during the summer season to assure life safety in all places of assembly.

Many State Fire Code changes were implemented to enhance public safety from the hazards of fire and carbon monoxide. The School fire safety education program continued and was very successful again this year

Building Department

On behalf of the building department I respectfully submit the following for the Annual Town Report.

We would like to thank the citizens, the Selectmen, the Town Administrators office, committee volunteers as well as the other town departments that we deal with on a daily basis for making the Town of Dennis such a pleasant place to work.

Contrary to popular belief, the Town of Dennis Building Department does more for the citizens of Dennis than simply issue building permits and conduct inspections of construction sites. The department is responsible for the administration, supervision, management and enforcement of multiple highly technical local, State and Federal regulations and ordinances. Some of those regulations include; the Town of Dennis Zoning By-law, Town of Dennis Sign Code, Town of Dennis Storm Water Management By-Law, 780 CMR the Massachusetts State Building Code, 521 CMR the Architectural Access Board, and the Commonwealth of MA Trench Law. The building department is the enforcement authority for three local historic entities; The Old Kings Highway Regional Historic District Committee, South Dennis Historic District Commission and the Dennis Historic Commission. Finally, our inspectors are appointed as Licensing Agents for the Town of Dennis Licensing Board.

As you may well imagine; with such a long list of responsibilities our office stays extremely busy despite the perception that tough economic times means less construction and subsequently, less work for the building department. In fact, in 2009 the building department realized a 3% increase in building permit activity over last years totals. You will see in the following pages that the department maintains an impressive list of responsibilities and completed tasks. Thanks to the dedication of the department staff, Linda McNeill, Mary Lou Hammond, LeeAnn Marcotte, James Barry, Anthony Teixeira, Donald Uitti, Richard Boudreau and

Health Department

What with troubled economic times continuing from last year, six weeks of rain this summer, and the emergence of the H1N1 influenza pandemic, 2009 was truly a year to remember. We were lucky to miss the first surge of H1N1 influenza this spring, but the fall brought not only a recrudescence of H1N1 flu but seasonal flu as well. In anticipation of a surge in demand for the H1N1 vaccine, we successfully tested our ability to rapidly vaccinate large numbers by holding a drive-through clinic for seasonal flu at the Nathaniel Wixon School in October. We held an additional seasonal flu clinic in October and, due to the limited supply of the H1N1 vaccine, we held 2 small clinics in November and December targeting the highest priority groups at risk for complications from the flu. We will be holding more clinics in early 2010. In July, we again presented Certificates of Excellence in Food Protection to those establishments that scored the highest during our food inspections of the previous year. Lastly, we continued our Sharps Collection Program for Dennis residents. We have available sharps containers in various sizes and will exchange them for full containers of sharps. Please call us for further details.

My thanks go to Noreen, Jackie, Jennifer Clarke, Jennifer Flood, Kristen, and Meggan for their professionalism. It has been an especially trying year for them. My thanks go to the Board of Health for their support and encouragement. Finally, my thanks go to my fellow department heads and town employees. As always, it has been a pleasure working with you.

BOARD OF HEALTH

The Board of Health conducts public hearings monthly on the second Thursday and a regularly scheduled workshop session on the fourth Thursday. All meeting locations are posted and the public hearing meetings can be viewed on the Town's public access television channel.

The Board wished a fond farewell to Barbara Bird who resigned for personal reasons and welcomed Joseph P. Bunce, Jr. and Robert Duffy as new members appointed by the Selectman. Although variance requests for relief from septic regulations were down, the Board was busy dealing with housing issues. These range from single family homes and summer cottage rentals to larger motel type establishments. After numerous complaints and a lengthy public hearing, the Board unanimously voted to revoke the licenses held by the Jonathan Edwards Motel. The owners were provided with guidance and requirements to be satisfied before a new license will issue. As of this writing, the owner has not sought reinstatement, although some improvements can be seen.

The Department staff was kept busy organizing and coordinating successful flu clinics. The first seasonal flu clinic was a drive through. It provided an excellent test for the H1N1 flu clinic which ran smoothly. This was a tremendous effort on the part of the Health Department and other Town resources and departments.

The Board wishes to thank the Health Department, Selectmen and Administration for their efforts and support.

Planning and Appeals Office

The Department of Planning and Appeals continues to be very busy. The Department provides assistance to many town committees including the Planning Board, Board of Appeals, Zoning By-law Study Committee, the Affordable Housing Trust, the Economic Development Committee and the Alternative Energy Committee. As always, working with all of these committees has led to another challenging and intriguing year.

Accomplishments

1. **Dennis Open Space and Recreation Plan** – The 2008 Open Space and Recreation Plan was completed and approved by the state. This document was prepared by the Dennis Department of Planning and Appeals with the assistance of the Natural Resources, Beaches, Recreation and Harbormasters Departments.
2. **Alternative Energy** – The Department continues to work with the Alternative Energy Committee on several initiatives. In 2009 we brought to Town Meeting an expanded wind by-law, zoning for manufacturing opportunities for green energy equipment companies in the town, and zoning which differentiates between accessory solar power generators and commercial solar energy production with an eye towards promoting commercial solar energy production in appropriate zoning districts. We are presently working on modifications to the Wind By-law to allow larger facilities in the Industrial District and on Dennis Water District properties.
3. **Regional Coordination** – The Department is working with the Cape cod Commission to take advantage of the opportunities provided by the Regional Policy Plan. In addition, the Department worked with the Commission on the local Multi-Hazard Mitigation Plan, a planning document required by the Federal Government.
4. **Affordable Housing** – Affordable housing continues to be a major issue in the Town of Dennis. The Zoning By-law Study Committee is reviewing the Affordable Housing By-law to determine whether changes are needed to this by-law, to make it more

understandable and useable to both the town and property owners.

5. **Dennisport Revitalization** – Dennisport is progressing even with the current economic conditions. The Planning Department continues to work with the Cape Cod Commission on the designation of the Dennisport Village Center as a Growth Incentive Zone. We worked with the Dennisport Revitalization Committee on its Design Charrette and will re-initiate discussions with the Cape Cod Commission on the Growth Incentive Zone with the completion of the final recommendations from this Charrette process.

6. **Hotel Resort District Planning** – The Dennis Economic Development Committee has been working for the past several years on a concept to create a new zoning district that would be known as the Hotel Resort District. The proposal calls for rezoning areas along the south coast and scattered portions of Route 28. The tourist trade for the town has been decreasing and the businesses that service this trade have been sorely hurt. As the seasonal tourist trade is recognized as an important asset to the town, the Economic Development Committee is studying possible zoning changes to allow the resurgence of the tourist economy. A major discussion on this issue took place in November regarding the future of the Cottage Colonies in Dennis. The Economic Development Committee agreed to work with cottage owners and the land owners in that part of town to better define the needs and appropriate zoning.

7. **Zoning By-law Revisions** – The Zoning By-law Study Committee continues to work its way through the Dennis Zoning By-law. The Committee is currently focusing on the Affordable Housing By-law previously discussed and revisions to the Non-conforming Use Section of the Zoning By-law to clarify the section and ensure consistency with recent state court rulings.

8. **Staff and Board Member Training** – The Dennis Town Planner is a Certified Planner through the American Institute of Certified Planners. The certification process involves testing and continuing education. The continuing professional education will require the planner to obtain 16 contact hours of ongoing training each year. The training will involve staying abreast of new

concepts in planning as well as staying abreast of changes in land use law and court decisions. This training takes place at larger seminars held in various locations around Massachusetts. In addition, the ever changing regulatory world requires that board members attend educational seminars aimed at ensuring that board members are aware of changes affecting their decision making. These training opportunities are offered generally on a regional basis.

9. **FEMA Flood Map Updates** – The Planning Department coordinated the review of the Federal Emergency Management Agency Flood Maps. These maps are a necessary part of the Federal Flood Insurance Program and identifies at risk properties. In 2009 the Department met with state and federal officials, held a public forum on the flood maps and disseminated information through the Planning Department Blog to over 5,000 individuals with questions on these maps.

10. **Public Information** – The Department of Planning and Appeals has stepped up its efforts over the past year to improve communication between the Town and the general populous of Dennis. This is being done through the use of Planning Department Blogs on general planning and specialized planning issues. The Dennis Planning Department Blogs are located at:

These efforts by the Dennis Planning Department were recognized in 2008 by being awarded the Social Advocacy Award by the Massachusetts Chapter of the American Planning Association and the Kenneth E. Pickard Municipal Innovation Award by the Massachusetts Municipal Association.

11. **Local Comprehensive Plan Update** – Yes it is that time again. The Department of Planning has initiated the update to the Local Comprehensive Plan. A survey is currently being conducted to gauge Dennis Residents interests on a number of issues of importance covering land use and community services.

I would also like to thank my assistant, Ms. Lynn Craig, whom without it would be very difficult to meet the demands set for this department.

Information Technology

To the Honorable Board of Selectmen and Citizens of the Town of Dennis: It is a pleasure to serve you.

The IT Department consists of four individuals; Dan Proto, Technical Support Specialist for Networking, Lorne Winkfield, Video and Production Specialist, Alicia Messier, Geographical Information Systems Specialist and Steve Buss, Director.

Ms. Messier came to us from Newtown, CT in August and immediately began organizing essential town data to put Dennis on the map through implementation of the GIS web portal. She also spearheads our Document Management project.

Mr. Proto joined our team in March bringing excellent networking skills and was essential in implementing the new phone system at Town Hall. He strengthened our antivirus and firewall protocols and established a state of the art email storage solution.

Mr. Winkfield continues to embellish our Government Information Channel with a robust broadcast schedule for our regulatory meetings and additional files for Video on Demand for the website.

While we have been busy bringing IT support to departments, Microsoft had been busy changing the entire digital landscape for organizations like ours by releasing Windows 7 and Office 2010. We are effectively implementing a five year technology reinvestment plan for the Next Generation network to meet this challenge because if we skip the new Windows and Office like we did the last time we will find ourselves in a difficult position to conduct business.

Another significant issue we face is how we handle paper records, digital data and historic documents. Our digital data doubles every three years and we hope to grapple with this by implementing a document management plan to re-engineering how staff manages, archives and retrieves data to meet state regulations and secure information for future generations.

Our goals and challenges for 2011 include the implementation of a:

- Phase II of the GIS initiative
- Online permit request and tracking system
- Document/records scanning and storage system
- Comcast Cable Contract renewal

Special thanks go to the IT team for their commitment to making our department successful. We also recognize Captain Monahan for his continued help in managing the technology at the Police Department.

Geographic Information System (GIS)

To the Honorable Board of Selectmen and Citizens of the Town of Dennis:

In 2009, a GIS Stakeholders group met and set the goal and objectives for obtaining a fully integrated GIS system for the town that would be accessible by the public and internally across

departments. This group consisted of members from Assessing, Engineering, Planning, Building, Police, Fire and Health departments.



The vision that came out of this group was to obtain tools and expertise to create a centralized GIS database that would be maintained on a regular basis and be accessible online. It also needed to be as accurate as possible.

The first order of business was to hire a full time GIS Specialist

to organize existing town data and maps and begin the task of digitizing it for posterity.

Alicia Messier (amessier@town.dennis.ma.us) met with each department separately to determine priorities and formulated a plan to organize parcel information and begin the process of digitizing town infrastructure from maps and drawings to lights on telephone poles to location and age of fire hydrants. The task is daunting when you consider that data has ended up in various places over the last century or two. There are files on computers and maps in vaults and plot lines in drawers in storage.

Pursuing this plan achieved a vibrant cross-departmental communication that has refreshed the way staff shares information

and works together. In short order, this will culminate with the enhanced ability to serve you better.

Our initial web GIS portal began in the spring of 2010 and can be found at www.town.dennis.ma.us. Now, when you lookup a parcel, not only do you get the owner of record, history and values, you get the capability to overlay additional data layers from flood zones to fire hydrants to watersheds and more.

As the importance and usefulness of GIS grows, we will move forward with eventually purchasing GPS equipment to extract out and catalogue ground points of interest

A special thanks to Bob Reed in Engineering who spent countless hours organizing town data for the last five years and was essential in getting GIS on the map.

Examples of special events included Annual Town Meetings, the town Energy Summit, Health Advisory

Committee Hearings, the 2009 Selectmen's Candidates' Debate, the Quarterly Tax Billing Info Video, the Swan Pond Algae Bloom Public Forum and the FEMA Flood Map Forum. The Saint Patrick's Day parade was carried live throughout the town on our website allowing people who couldn't be there to enjoy it. We also began broadcasting Water District meetings.

Our video staff consists of Video Production Specialist, Lorne Winkfield who manages overall production and video on demand (VOD) integration on the website. VOD allows you to watch meetings via your computer anytime anyplace. Linda Fleming and Lynn Bigelow round out the staff and a special note of appreciation goes to them for making our meetings look great on TV. The quality of the broadcasts; from audio levels, video signals to lower third graphics can all attributed to their skills.

Over the past year, we completed equipment installations at the Police Department Community Room and the Senior Center allowing for live coverage of meetings.

In the year ahead, we hope to expand our presence in your home by providing more coverage of live and taped meetings, and events and continue our quality production of videos and Government Access Programming for Cable and Web.

Agricultural Commission

The Dennis Agricultural commission was appointed by the Board of Selectmen. The following Dennis residents were appointed by the Selectmen: Jeff Deck of Not Enough Acres Farm, Jennifer Holloman of Ocean Song Farm, John Lowell of the East Dennis Oyster Farm, Laura McDowell May of Dennis, Veronica Worthington of the Seaweed and Codfish Farm, and Jason Beetz (alternate) of Ocean Song Farm. The commission voted to meet once per month and typically meets on Wednesday evenings at 7:00 p.m.

The Board of Selectmen have requested that the commission's prioritized charge include researching what type of agricultural uses may be best suited on existing parcels that the Town of Dennis has purchased at the urging of taxpayers.

The main project for the group in FY2009 was to get the Request for Proposal, (RFP) aligned with the goals of agricultural use for the Melpet Farm Property. A subcommittee was formed with Tanya Daigneault, Laura McDowell-May, Veronica Worthington and Jen Holloman in attendance. The group adapted the Melpet Farm RFP designed by William Clark from the Barnstable County extension service used to collect bids for the Barnstable County Farm Complex Property. The group thought this document and process was worthy of adopting because it clearly delineated responsibilities of potential lessees while keeping in the forefront the needs of the Town of Dennis as lesser. Tanya Daigneault ultimately tightened up the proposed changes and verbiage and acted as liaison between the Agricultural Committee and Dole & Bailey and the Dennis Housing Authority.

In addition, to holding regular meetings the group volunteered to host the All-Cape Agricultural Commission gathering and did so on November 7th, 2009. This event was a huge success and featured a moderated panel around the needs of the small scale processor on Cape Cod. Representatives from various agricultural commissions around the cape were in attendance, Falmouth,

Yarmouth, Barnstable, Orleans agricultural task force, Brewster along with excellent panelists from the State of Massachusetts Department of Agricultural Resources, The Massachusetts Farm Bureau and the South Eastern Massachusetts Agricultural Partnership (SEMAP), and local farms. In the afternoon session a presentation was given on marketing and how farmers can get their farm name out there in the public domain. Judy Volhmer also took an opportunity to highlight the work of the Barnstable County 4-H Organization.

A major highlight of the day was the luncheon which was comprised of purely locally grown and harvested meat, seafood and vegetables where all members lent a hand in the preparation. Tanya Daigneault, Jeff Deck, Jen Holloman, Laura McDowell and Veronica Worthington cooked the food with Jason Beetz and John Lowell dealing with set up of the meeting place. For this group a solidifying event and showed the efforts of the group that have developed in the last year 2009.

Alternative Energy Advisory Committee

Our biggest project this year was a Photovoltaic System for the Dennis Police Station. With overwhelming public support at the November 2008 Town Meeting; funds were approved for a PV system on a municipal building. After researching buildings in the town, we decided the new police station was the best location for the system. As the biggest obstacle was the location in the historic district, we worked closely with Old King's Highway. With support from the Chief of Police, the Board of Selectmen and the citizens of Dennis, we presented the project to OKH at two hearings. The system was approved 3-2 in August 2009. Greg Rounseville (DPW) orchestrated the bidding process. The system will be installed this spring.

At the May 2009 Town Meeting we presented proposed zoning by-laws for wind energy. Again with overwhelming public support, they were passed. The first by-law allows for ten foot rooftop facilities in all commercial and residential areas. Wind towers up 80 feet tall are permitted on school grounds, golf courses, and on water district lands. Forty foot towers are allowed in the General Commercial I and III zoning districts. Large towers are permitted only in the industrial zoned area near the DPW. A zoning by-law change also allows for light manufacturing, paving the way for green jobs in Dennis.

After nearly two years working towards a test tower for a wind turbine at the landfill, as of December 4th, we have an operating Sodar unit operating collecting required wind data. This is a preliminary step towards our ultimate goal of building wind turbines there to help reduce the Town of Dennis' dependence on foreign oil.

We are holding an Energy Savings Seminar March 20th to educate the public about ways to conserve energy. We hope to involve Wixon students with a poster contest.

We continue to follow new projects including a collaboration with Cape & Vineyard Electric, Con Edison and Cape Light Compact to install a 162 KW Photovoltaic System on the DPW roof.

We are attending meetings with the Water district regarding hopes for a 240 foot turbine to help defray costs of their electricity.

INSURANCE ADVISORY COMMITTEE

The Insurance Advisory Committee was appointed in 2008 and consists of one representative from each employee bargaining unit and a retiree from the Town.

The main focus of the IAC in 2009 was recommending that the Town adopt MGL Ch. 32B, Section 9D which will provide a surviving spouse of a deceased employee/retiree at least 50% of the group premium cost of insurance. Currently a surviving spouse pays 100% of the premium. This was adopted at the May Annual Town Meeting and will become effective on July 1, 2010.

The IAC also recommended that the Town adopt MGL Ch. 32B, Section 18A which requires all retirees who retire after the acceptance of this section, their spouses and dependents who are enrolled in Medicare Part A at no cost to a retiree be required to enroll in a Medicare health benefits supplement plan offered by the Town. This was adopted at the May Annual Town Meeting and took effect immediately.

Discussion also took place in regards to the Town researching and comparing the current Health plans under the Cape Cod Municipal Health Group with the Massachusetts Group Insurance Commission. An analysis and comparison was performed by Boston Benefit Partners and we would like to thank the Town for conducting that study.

The IAC generally meets on Wednesday afternoons at 5:30 p.m.

We would like to thank the Board and the Town Administration for their cooperation and diligence and look forward to further charges assigned.

DENNISPORT REVITALIZATION COMMITTEE, (DRC)

The Dennis Port Revitalization Committee met the third Monday of each month in the Community Room of the Dennis Library at 6:00 PM and more frequently as necessary.

The DRC had a very active, engaging and dynamic year completing the many tasks associated with conducting our community reinvention event held from October 1 through 5 called a Design Charrette. These tasks included completion of the winter workshop series of topic meetings, securing funding commitments and donations, and contracting with our selected charrette facilitator, B. Dennis Town & Building Design.

In hosting the event for the Town of Dennis the DRC was fortunate to receive numerous in-kind contributions of food, lodging, facilities and other logistical support from many members of the community and we thank them for their support. Additionally, the DRC wishes to thank all those who participated. We had 130 in attendance for the opening workshop and many who dropped by for the topic discussion series. Over 70 were present Monday the 5th for the summation presentation of the work in progress made by the community during the Charrette weekend. The to-be-published "Work in Progress" report on the findings of the community's vision including maps, architectural renderings and a matrix of coordinated activities necessary to move the vision forward through implementation is scheduled to be presented to the Selectmen early 2010.

During 2009 the Village has seen the establishment of a strong collaboration named the Merchants of Dennis Port which meets Thursday mornings. The Merchants created an inclusive map of all the current businesses in the village which is distributed for free. Many community groups also work to keep up the spirit of the

community. The South Side Civic Association continued its summer concert series. The Dennis Business Association hosted several events including a big tent crafts fair. The Dennis Chamber of Commerce Government Affairs Committee led a breakfast discussion to consider how to advance the progress made during the Charrette. Private investment at the old A&P building includes a new facade and landscaping and new tenants in the spring.

Arising out of the publicity of the Charrette, the Economic Development Committee engaged members of the cottage community with a presentation by Town Planner Dan Fortier, discussion will resume in the spring. Issues already take up by the Town have a greater and potentially critical impact on revitalization initiatives and the DRC continues to liaison with Town departments and other committees. In support of these efforts the DRC has added new members and now has seven seats filled.

ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT COMMITTEE

The Economic Development Committee had another strong year in 2009. The following provides key highlights of these efforts:

Dennisport Revitalization

The Committee continues to work with the Cape Cod Commission on the designation of the Dennisport Village Center as a Growth Incentive Zone. Such a designation would give the area regional identification as an important investment area. The designation would also reduce some of the regional review issues for the village. This submittal was placed on hold for the past year to allow the Dennisport Revitalization Committee to conduct its Design Charrette. Pending the final report of this charrette, the EDC will re-initiate the GIZ process with the Commission.

Hotel Resort District Planning

The Dennis Economic Development Committee has been working for the past several years on a concept to create a new zoning district that would be known as the Hotel Resort District. The initial concept is that there are three areas along the southern coast of the town that was developed as resort type areas. Due to the historic development patterns that took place prior to the adoption of zoning for these areas, subsequent zoning that did not take into account the existing land use patterns, and changes in the tourist trade, these areas have not been able to keep up with the needs of modern travelers. As such, the tourist trade for the town has been decreasing and the businesses that service this trade have been sorely hurt. As the seasonal tourist trade is recognized as an important asset to the town, the Economic Development Committee is studying possible zoning changes to allow the resurgence of the tourist economy. The Committee met with a large contingent of representatives of the Old Wharf Road Cottage Colonies in November as part of this process and agreed to further study the role of these uses in the Dennis Zoning By-law.

The Economic Development Committee will greatly miss the participation of Charles Chamberlain who passed away this year.

We will also miss the leadership of Lester J. Murphy, Jr. who has been an able chair of this committee for several years who moved onto other services to the Town of Dennis.

The EDC would also thank Town Planner Daniel Fortier for his assistance to the Committee and the rest of the Planning Office staff as well.

Cape Cod Regional Transit Authority

The Cape Cod Regional Transit Authority with the door-to-door b-bus service has provided 308 clients (unduplicated count) in Dennis with 13,394 one-way passenger trips from July 2008 through June 2009 (FY09). In FY08 CCRTA provided 335 clients with 14,573 one-way passenger trips from July 2007 through June 2008. Total b-bus passenger trips in the fifteen towns of Cape Cod were 174,011 in FY08 compared to 169,583 in FY09.

CCRTA FY09 records for the Boston Hospital Transportation service indicates 36 Dennis residents took 218 one-way trips on this service.

The fixed route Hyannis to Orleans (H20) serves the towns of Barnstable, Yarmouth, Dennis, Harwich, Chatham and Orleans along the route 28 corridors. A total of 17,414 one-way trips originated in Dennis for the H20 route for the period July 2008 through June 2009; total ridership for the H20 route for this period was 81,879.

CCRTA has a web page on the Internet (www.capecodrta.org). Route maps, schedules, fares, Google Transit Trip Planner and the latest news about Cape Cod public transportation services are provided at this site, as well as links to many other transportation resources.

Cape Light Compact

The Cape Light Compact was formed in 1997 following two years of study and votes of town boards of selectmen and town council. It is organized through a formal intergovernmental agreement signed by all 21 member towns and Barnstable and Dukes counties. The purpose of the Cape Light Compact is to advance the interests of consumers in a competitive electric supply market, including the promotion of energy efficiency. Each participating municipality has a representative on the Compact Governing Board, which sets policy and works with staff, technical and legal support to advance the Cape Light Compact programs.

POWER SUPPLY

In 2009, the Cape Light Compact (Compact) provided energy to residents and businesses in accordance with a competitive electricity supply contract negotiated by the Compact with ConEdison *Solutions*. Oil and natural gas prices were extremely volatile in 2008 with oil hitting its peak in July and then falling precipitously. Prices for 2009 were largely locked-in, in late 2008 when energy markets had decreased significantly from their peaks in July of 2008. Natural gas, electricity, and other energy prices continued to trend down in 2009. While the Compact's prices in 2009 did not reflect this (due to locking in prices at the end of 2008), 2010 prices will reflect this decrease. The Compact is actively pursuing strategies to stabilize prices at these attractive 2010 levels.

As of December 2009, the Compact had 12,169 electric accounts in the Town of Dennis on its energy supply.

ENERGY EFFICIENCY

From January to October 2009, rebates and other efficiency incentive programs provided to the town by the Compact totaled approximately \$436,869 and brought savings to 811 participants and brought savings of \$191,381. Cumulative annual kilowatt-hours of energy saved for the Town of Dennis from 2001-2009 is 10,154,991 kWh with an annual savings in 2009 of 956,905 kWh.

From 2003 through October 2009 programs for Dennis included:

- 4,779 participants in our energy efficiency programs
- \$1,369,331 has been saved by the participants
- Money spent by the Cape Light compact in rebates and incentives totals \$1,916,004
- 351 low-income participants
- 124 ENERGY STAR® qualified new homes
- Specifically for calendar year 2009 the Dennis Public Library received energy efficient lighting upgrades, 12 small businesses received energy efficient lighting upgrades one large and eight small businesses received energy efficient refrigeration upgrades and an energy management system was installed in the Nathaniel H. Wixon Middle school.

Funding for the energy efficiency programs¹ (i.e. energy audits for homes and businesses, rebates on the purchase of energy efficient appliances and energy education in our schools) comes from a monthly customer “energy conservation” charge (\$0.0025 cents multiplied by the number of kilowatt hours used during the month) that appears on each customer’s electric bill.

Other Cape Light Compact efforts include:

- As part of the Solarize Our Schools program, the solar array at the Wixon Middle School has generated a total of 6,505 kWh of electricity since its installation in December, 2006 and avoided over 11,228 lbs of CO₂ from entering the atmosphere.

ROAD SAFETY TASK FORCE

Regularly scheduled meetings are held monthly on the third Thursday at 6 p.m. at the Department of Public Works meeting room, as posted in Town Hall.

The committee is charged by the Selectmen to investigate vehicular and pedestrian safety issues on town roads. We make recommendations to town officials for possible infrastructure improvements, personnel needs, or operational components such as sidewalks, traffic lights/signs, speed zones, etc. that enhance the safety of motorists and pedestrians. Our committee consists of 5 volunteer members and 2 staff liaisons (town engineer and police representative).

A major accomplishment for the committee this year was the Master Sidewalk Plan that was presented to and accepted by the Selectmen. This 5 year plan included the successful funding of \$250,000 that was approved by the voters at the May Annual Town Meeting. The money was utilized throughout the balance of the year to construct sidewalks that filled in gaps along Lower County Road, Old Bass River Rd., Trotting Park Rd. and other locations. It is the goal of the committee to ensure the continued funding for the completion of the Plan.

During the year our committee heard and addressed the concerns of many residents regarding safety issues in their neighborhoods. Working with the staff liaisons, the committee discussed strategies, developed solutions and implemented actions to successfully resolve many of these issues.

Topics reviewed at our regular meetings included: Police representatives conducted three AAA "Older and Wiser" senior driving courses during the year and held a "Safe Driving for Mature Operators" – 2 day class in the Fall; Swan River Rd. re-construction was completed with a new road widening and surface to include complete sidewalks; Safety and parking was improved around the Harwich Jr. Theater area; Road safety and new lights were begun at the Rte. 28/Rte.134 intersection; Route 6A was re-

surfaced by the State which included improved crosswalks and markings. The speed trailer was seen constantly around town in various locations contributing to road safety consciousness.

The public is reminded and urged to report any safety concerns they may have to the Road Safety Task Force for their study and recommendations. We are here for your needs.

DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC WORKS

The Department of Public Works (DPW) is a team of skilled men and women that respond to all weather emergencies as required including but not limited to snow, ice, rain and wind events. Some of the major functions of the DPW include the following; operation of the Transfer Station, maintenance of the roads, beaches, cemeteries, parks, municipal grounds, vehicles and equipment. The DPW also provides support for other Town Departments and civic organizations.

Special projects completed this year include maintenance and cleanup at Johnny Kelly Park including the Braille trail, removing trees, stump grinding, brush and spreading wood chips; install cart path at the Dennis Pines Golf Course; excavating and grading for an addition to the maintenance garage at the Highlands Golf Course; construction of a 220' retaining wall at the Highlands; removed and replaced all cross bracings on the pilings of the Swan River Bridge at Lower County Road; repaired sink hole at West Dennis Graded School parking lot; preparation for new sidewalks at Lower County Road opposite Sea View Park including construction of a retaining wall; remove, prep and repave sidewalk on New Boston Rd., maintenance and repair of existing sidewalks in Dennisport and on Main St. in South Dennis. Many other projects were completed as well.

Drainage systems were installed or repaired at Depot St., Lane Rd., Clarlaw Way, Horsefoot Path in Dennis, Hickory Lane, Bogie Way and Thorwald, Center St., Route 134 at Lickety Split, Pleasant St. in East Dennis, Seameadow Dr., Lower County Rd. and Trotting Park Rd. and Dunes Road. Catch Basins were repaired at the following locations; Market Place, Gilbert Rd. at Telegraph Rd., Route 134 north of Bob Crowell Rd., Michael's Ave., Barnhouse Rd., Golfcourse Rd., Matthew St., Great Western Rd., Loring Ave., Forest Pines, Kings Row, Highhead Hillside, Stonewall Way, Hokum Rock Rd.

The winter season 2008 – 2009 had its first sanding event on December 7, 2008. The first plowing event occurred on December

19, 2008 and total accumulation was 7.5” the largest snowfall of the season. In total there were 36 snow and ice events; of which 6 required hiring plowing vendors. A total of 42” of snow accumulated on the roads of Dennis.

The Highway and Grounds divisions support the Secondary Roads Improvement Program and the Chapter 90 State Aid Projects by performing preparatory work such as pruning roadside vegetation, cutting back shoulders, adjusting structures, asphalt joint cutting, sweeping and any other supplemental work. Upon completion of the paving, these locations are loamed and seeded and pavement line painting is scheduled. This work occurred on 20 roadways throughout the town as listed in the Engineering Department’s report.

Special projects for beaches include lowering Howes Street Beach walkway; erosion control fencing was installed at several locations; new pavement preparation for West Dennis and Bayview beach parking lots; installed stone trench at Bayview; fabrication and installation of signs. Seaweed was removed by mechanical surf rake and transported to the Transfer Station and incorporated into compost.

The packer truck arrived in June, just in time to help us with the busy summer season. This truck is equipped with a J Hook and we can swap out the packer unit with a dump body and sander unit so that this truck is utilized throughout the year. The packer truck allows the DPW to use one truck vs. two to three to pick up trash at all of the beaches, parks and playgrounds. In addition to the significant fuel savings of approximately \$10,000 per year, the employees required to do this valuable service went from four to two. All personnel efficiencies gained were reallocated to building and grounds maintenance including Sea View Park.

Routine maintenance was performed over the remainder of the year on public roads. During the year activities included tree trimming, brush cutting, mowing, roadside cleanup, pothole patching, asphalt repair, street sweeping, fabrication and installation of street signs, catch basin cleaning and grading dirt roads.

Many old, illegible and non reflective street signs continue to be replaced with Manual of Uniform Traffic Control Devices (MUTCD) compliant signs that are clear with larger fonts and are reflective at night. More than two hundred street signs on the following streets have been replaced; Sesuit Neck Rd., Pond St., Loring Ave., Swan River Road., Forest Pines Rd., Forest Hills Rd., Horsefoot Path, East Bay View, Duck Pond Rd., Kelley's Pond Rd., Country Circle and Cassidy Ave. Unfortunately over 100 street signs are stolen or vandalized annually, and approximately 30 signs were damaged as a result of motor vehicle accidents resulting in \$8,000 to \$10,000 plus labor for replacement cost. More than 200 stop, crosswalk and speed limit signs were replaced as needed.

The Board of Selectmen adopted a Private Road Snow Removal Policy as recommended by DPW. Annually the 501 private roads in town or approximately 74 center line miles will be inspected for minimum objective criteria. In order for private roads to be plowed in the winter the criteria must be met. All residents living on private roads are encouraged to access the Town's website at www.town.dennis.ma.us and review the Private Road Snow Removal Policy and other documents on the Engineering Division web page pertaining to private roads under the application link. One is titled "Temporary Repair to Private Roads" policy and petition and Road Acceptance-Policy and Petition. Private roads are either owned by the developer or the abutters to the road unless the deed specifies something different. The budget for private road maintenance is at \$10,000 or \$2,500 less than budgeted in FY 2003. Private road maintenance is limited and restricted to emergencies and to private roads that must be used to travel through the public road network.

The DPW assisted the Department of Natural Resources with the annual maintenance and mowing of the Crowes Pasture biodiversity area, community gardens, blueberry patch, Whitfield-Johnson property and various other locations. Additional projects performed at the request of DNR included grading of access roads into Crowes Pasture and repairing the ORV access ramp to Chapin Beach.

CEMETERIES

The Department of Public Works manages and maintains fourteen cemeteries within the five villages of Dennis. Five cemeteries remain active and demand regular attention, including Oak Ridge, Dennis Village, South Dennis Congregational Church, Swan Lake Annex, and West Dennis. Approximately 80 acres of property are designated for cemetery use and 43 acres are currently developed and maintained. We are responsible for the mowing and trimming of these grounds, and in addition to these duties brush was cleared, and many of the trees were pruned.

The Chamberlain Foundation presented the town with a significant cash donation to pave some of the road network at South Dennis Congregational Church Cemetery. Trees donated by Rick Hamlin and Debra Barbo were planted at Oak Ridge and Swan Lake Annex Cemeteries. These donations are greatly appreciated for improving these cemeteries.

Projects funded by the Community Preservation Fund include an assessment from Fannin Lerhner, preservation consultant, of 41 gravestones and monuments. Technical recommendations for preserving these monuments were prepared and the work will commence during 2010. Ground Penetrating Radar brought in by the Town of Harwich was used to identify unmarked graves at Old South Dennis Cemetery, adjacent to Town Hall.

The Cemetery Advisory Committee, led by Chairman Bruce Hill, met monthly to serve the community as a forum for public input and education. An open house was conducted at South Dennis Congregational Church Cemetery during May and was well attended. A tour of the cemetery was given and recent improvements to the entrance gate and crypts were showcased. Sincere gratitude is extended to the Cemetery Advisory Committee for their efforts throughout the year and to everyone that contributed their time and energy to make this a successful event.

There were 98 interments at the five active cemeteries, and 59 grave spaces sold in Oak Ridge Cemetery. Currently Oak Ridge Cemetery is the only cemetery with grave spaces available.

SOLID WASTE and RECYCLING

The Transfer Station and Recycling Facility processed more than 13,000 tons of material. Approximately 8,000 tons of solid waste was transported to SEMASS Waste to Energy Facility in Rochester, Mass. where it is burned to generate electricity. Approximately 1,200 tons of construction and demolition materials were hauled to the Town of Bourne's Integrated Solid Waste Facility. Approximately 5,600 tons of cardboard, paper, plastic, televisions, computers, mattresses, glass, metals, seaweed, brush, leaves and grass clippings materials were diverted from the waste stream and recycled. The commodity markets were generous and revenues received from recycling include metal and cans \$33,660; newspaper and magazines \$9,310; cardboard \$6,400, and approximately \$5,000 generated from miscellaneous recycling including glass and plastic.

Environmental Partners, an engineering firm, hired to investigate, evaluate and make recommendations for improvements to the twenty year old Transfer Station issued their final report. The staff and the Town Administrator are in the process of reviewing this report and will begin to implement changes as guided by the Board of Selectmen.

The Mary Hood Hagler Reusable Goods Building offers an alternative to disposal and is staffed by citizen volunteers managed by the Recycling Commission. If you have items that still have usefulness please stop by and ask if they can be accepted. The Department is grateful for all of the volunteers that make this program work.

All books that are dropped off are first made available to citizens frequenting the Swap Shop at the Mary Hagler Building. Books that are not reused after a period of time are set aside along with books that contain dated material such as textbooks and encyclopedias for the non-profit organization Hands Across the Water. This organization recycles all books it receives by providing books for

literacy and educational promotion in the United States and the international community.

The DPW and the Recycling Commission sponsor a logo contest, alternating between the Wixon Middle School and the Ezra H. Baker School every year for a new design for the Transfer Station stickers. This year it was the Ezra H. Baker School's chance to participate. First place winner's artwork is the initial pass design and second place artwork is the secondary pass design. The purpose is to encourage awareness and participation of recycling in our younger generation. Congratulations to all the participants of the 2009 logo contest, especially to First Place winner, Jacob Philbrook, and Second Place winner, Kaely Foster. Honorable Mentions were awarded to Tucker Jones, Corrine Dupee, Anna Kowalski and Drew Harmon. All six households received a free Transfer Station sticker.

Thank you for your continued efforts in recycling, not only is recycling good for the environment, it generates much needed revenue. If you have any questions regarding solid waste or recycling please call (508)-760-6230.

In closing I wish to express my gratitude to the citizens of Dennis for your continued support throughout the year. Special thanks to the Police and Fire Departments for providing training, assistance and a safe work zone to our crews. I also appreciate all the support we receive from the Board of Selectmen, Administrative staff from Town Hall, Steve Estey and all of the Municipal Buildings crew, and all other Departments we receive assistance from. I wish to extend many thanks to David Larkowski and the Dennis Water District for all their help throughout the year and especially during the winter months.

Most importantly I would like to thank the talented and skilled Public Works team. The Public Works staff is creative and evaluates service delivery, offer recommendations and implements efficiencies whenever possible. The Town is very fortunate to have a skilled and talented Public Works team that is committed to providing quality services.

Engineering Department

The Dennis Engineering Department provides survey, design and construction oversight in the maintenance and replacement of the Town's various infrastructure components. Engineering staff also provides technical reviews of new subdivision roads and commercial site developments, administers road opening and utility construction permits, maintains all town maps, assigns house numbers and together with the Dennis Police Department, monitors traffic safety issues.

Despite the slow down in the economy, construction and other infrastructure work in the town during 2009 was very active. In addition to the usual road resurfacing and drainage work described below, two parks (Seaview Park in Dennisport and Bass River Park in West Dennis, were constructed, a bridge (Highbank Road over Bass River) was reconstructed, expansion of the Highlands Golf maintenance building and storage yard was completed and numerous sidewalks were replaced or resurfaced. Also adding to the construction activity around town were several MassHighway projects for which Engineering staff provided support and represented resident interests. These projects included: the reconstruction of Swan River Road; the reconstruction of the Rte 28 & Rte 134 Intersection; and the resurfacing of Rte 6A.

Road work funded through Chapter 90 State Aid included the resurfacing of Old Bass River Rd (Old Fishhouse Rd to Asack Dr); Rte 134 (Jasmine Way to Old Chatham Rd) and Lower County Road (Lighthouse Rd to South Village Rd and Sea St to Division St); and the reconstruction of Division St and Sea St in Dennisport. Chapter 90 funds also funded the previously mentioned repairs to the Highbank Rd Bridge. Roads resurfaced under the Secondary Road Program funded by annual town meeting were Gilbert Rd, Smith St and Lane Rd, Siasconset Ave, Naushon Rd, Elliot Dr, Captain Philips Rd, Clarlaw Way, Folger Ln, and portions of Sesuit Neck Rd and Highland Rd.

Other projects completed during the year included sidewalk repairs on portions of Division St, Trotting Park Rd, Old Bass River Rd, New

Boston Rd and Lower County Rd; installation of a culvert pipe under Pleasant St in East Dennis; and the installation of drainage systems at 15 problem areas throughout the town. Engineering staff also oversaw the resurfacing of all roads in the Wrinkle Point area under the "Temporary Repairs on Private Ways " bylaw; resurfacing of Bayview Beach and portions of West Dennis Beach parking lot and the replacement of the Uncle Freeman's Landing dock.

Planning and design work was either begun or continued on the following projects: Westerly Extension of the Cape Cod Rail Trail; Reconstruction of Rte 134 (Rte 28 to Upper County Rd) to include bicycle and pedestrian traffic; replacement of the Upper County Rd Bridge over Swan Pond River, replacement of the dock at Aunt Julia Ann's Landing; and sidewalks on Lower County Rd, Beach St and Main St, South Dennis.

Community Preservation Committee

Under the Community Preservation Act, funding is derived from both Town and State sources. Appropriations, made only by Town Meeting, provide grants exclusively for open space and recreation, historic preservation and community housing.

The 2009 Annual Town Meeting approved a committee budget of \$1,239,383, including a State contribution estimated at \$278,621. (The State grant, when received, was actually \$382,000). After a careful evaluation process, the committee recommended and the October Special Town Meeting approved the following projects:

Open Space and Recreation

\$51,450 for further improvements to Bass River Park.

Historic Preservation

\$30,000 to the Dennis Historical Society for further preservation and archiving of historic documents and artifacts

\$508,074 to the Town for major preservation and improvements of the Re. Josiah Dennis Manse

\$1,800,000 in Community Preservation borrowing for major preservation and improvements of the Rev. Josiah Dennis Manse.

The Upweller project has had great success this year. The Friends of Dennis Shellfishing have established a donation account that is designated to be used to purchase seed for the Upweller project, in order for it to continue next year.

INFORMATION:

Our shellfish resources have benefitted greatly from our volunteer program CRABS (Commercial Recreational Association for Better Shellfishing). CRABS volunteers have donated over 1,200 hours over the past three years. Some notable projects included the oyster reef program, upweller quahogs, and herring run restoration. Again, a special thanks to two CRABS, George Platt and Fran Donovan, who especially this year with the Department being short staffed, volunteered to maintain the upweller.

This department continues to culture shellfish in two upwellers at Captain Hardings Lane, Bass River. Barnstable County released funds even in these hard budget times to allow the Shellfish Enhancement Program to provide to the Town 150,000 seed quahogs. Further, a donation account was established by the Friends of Dennis Shellfishing during these hard budget times to offset and assist the shellfish public aquaculture line item of the Towns budget. The Town received \$1,520.00 and those funds were used to purchase 400,000 seed quahogs. Long range planning is a constant objective and focus as we look toward expanding our Aquaculture grant areas and increasing our propagation efforts. Giving the opportunity for the Town to grow 550,000 seed quahogs in our upwellers and distribute them throughout Grand Cove and Bass River.

Habitat restoration and shellfish propagation has continued with the remote set oyster program, enhancing our population of oysters in Bass River. In cooperation with the Barnstable County Shellfish Enhancement Program, 120 bags of shell stock containing approximately 80,000 seed oysters were provided.

We could not believe it when the Town had an unexpected visit from a manatee in Sesuit Harbor, again, for the second year in a row. The Manatee are native to Florida but occasionally travel up the east coast but not, or so we thought, to the cold waters of our north coast.

The Shellfish Department would like to take this opportunity to thank the Cape Cod Salties for their continued efforts supporting and maintaining our herring runs.

Coastal Resources Committee

The Coastal Resources Committee (CRC) is charged to promote regional awareness of coastal issues by serving as a conduit or liaison for the exchange of information between Cape Cod communities. The CRC consists of a representative and an alternate, nominated from the Selectmen, from each Cape Cod town. Additionally, it includes a representative nominated by each of the following and appointed by the County Commissioners: Barnstable County Commissioners, Assembly of Delegates, Cape Cod Commission, Barnstable County Selectmen's Association, Barnstable County Department of Health and Human Services, Barnstable County Extension service, Barnstable County Shellfish Advisory Committee, Natural Resources Conservation Service/Cape Cod Conservation District, and the Cape Cod National Seashore.

The CRC focus this year was our continuing effort to support the USDA Natural Resources Conservation Service's (NRCS) Small Watersheds Program where our Cape Cod Water Resources Restoration Project was just funded to the amount of twenty-four million dollars. The NRCS and their collaborators, including the Town, will use these funds for positive impacts for ground water aquifer, shellfish beds, salt marshes and herring runs.

Waterways Commission

During 2009 the Waterways Commission and Harbormaster's Office continued to find ways to increase revenues and hold down costs. In 2010 we will be working on the Waterways Regulation By-Laws.

We were very fortunate to have the Army Corp of Engineers back for a second year in a row to dredge Sesuit Harbor this past summer. Hopefully they will return in the summer of 2010. The County dredged the harbor from the fuel dock to the yacht club. That material was used for beach nourishment for Cold Storage Beach. A consultant has been hired to collect data necessary to move forward with new dredging permits for the Inner Harbor.

We replaced the work boat to our fleet. It was built entirely by Terry and his crew. The motor and controls were taken from the old boat; therefore Terry was able to keep the cost down. What was left of the old boat went to our disposal area. More new bubblers were obtained allowing half the docks to remain in the water. There are two more main docks being built along with some new fingers. The town also received two Hazelett Elastic Moorings on a trial basis. Both the northside and the southside were able to try them out. They have proven to work. The Westside parking problems seemed to be resolved by Terry's constant policing of the lot. Improvements were also made at Highbank Landing and Uncle Freeman's.

We would like to thank two of our committee members John Simpson and Walter Hulse for serving as representatives on The Barrier Beach Management Plan and Regulation Task Force. Thanks to Chief Whalen, Terry Clen and Rick Lamont for helping to secure our financing to maintain a safe and well run harbor.

The Waterways Commission would like to acknowledge Jeff Giunta's resignation as Vice- Chairperson and thank him for his services. Mark Lambton has been elected to take over as Vice-Chairperson and Walter Hulse was elected as Secretary.

In closing, the Commission would like to recognize the passing of Jack Kearney this past fall. He served as an unpaid Assistant Harbormaster for 25 years. He will be remembered for all his dedication to the Town of Dennis. Also, we would like to extend a heartfelt condolence to his wife Gladys.

Comprehensive Wastewater Management Plan Task Force

Continued progress on the development of a Comprehensive Wastewater Management Plan hinges on the publication of the findings by the Massachusetts Estuaries Project (MEP); a project that began more than five years ago. Water quality sampling, environmental analysis and computer modeling are essential elements of the MEP study and will culminate in the determination of the Total Maximum Daily Limit for nitrogen entering into the Town's coastal embayments.

The Stormwater Runoff Subcommittee continued their work on developing a draft Stormwater Runoff Bylaw and corresponding Rules and Regulations. The draft was then presented to the Task Force and reviewed at length. Several modifications by the Task Force were made and the Bylaw and regulations were recommended in their entirety. In May, the final draft was forwarded to the Board of Selectmen for their consideration. The Selectmen scheduled a public hearing during the summer and the Bylaw was adopted at the Special Fall Town Meeting.

In the spring, the Board of Selectmen reviewed a request by the Dennis Water District to file legislation to enable them to become a sewer district. The Board agreed to waive their right as a town to construct a sewer system and support the District's filing of legislation to meet and support agreed to waive their right as a town to construct a sewer system and support the District's filing of legislation to meet that organizational goal and placed an article on the annual town warrant. Although the District has demonstrated a strong commitment to the wastewater planning effort for a number of years, the Water Commissioners temporarily suspended their involvement in continuing to fund environmental studies related to the Comprehensive Wastewater Management Plan. In light of their vote, the Board of Selectmen voted to withdraw their support of the special legislation for the district and requested that the Task Force refocus their efforts on developing a CWMP for the Town of Dennis.

In an effort to engage the public in the wastewater management discussion the Task Force has moved its meeting to early evening and has invited several consultants to make presentations on wastewater management issues. The membership continues to be involved and many often attend seminars and workshops held by citizen groups, consultants, and environmental agencies.

Regional Efforts

During 2009, the Cape Cod Water Protection Collaborative continued its work to protect and restore the water resources so valuable to the Cape. The Board of the Collaborative is comprised of 1 representative appointed by each town and two members appointed by the County Commissioners. The ordinance governing the Collaborative was amended in 2009 to include, as non-voting ex-officio members, the Executive Director of the Cape Cod Commission and the Director of the County Health and Environment Department.

The Collaborative continued to focus its work on making water protection more affordable and less daunting for the communities on Cape Cod. The major highlights for 2009 are as follows:

1. Ensuring appropriate implementation by the state of the provisions of the Environmental Bond Bill, passed in 2008, which provides 0% interest loans for wastewater projects under the State Revolving Loan Fund. The Collaborative invested significant time working with the two relevant state agencies to ensure that the intent of the law was preserved as the governing regulations were developed.
2. Monitoring state regulations to ensure that the interests of the Cape are taken into account as regulations are developed. The Collaborative successfully intervened to ensure that draft groundwater discharge regulations that would have raised the cost of wastewater disposal were amended to meet the Cape's needs at a much lower cost.
3. Initiating a groundbreaking review of the state and federal wetlands regulations to determine if wetlands can be altered to minimize the need for sewerage in the watersheds of impaired bays. The outcome of this project will determine if towns will have the ability to pursue wetlands alteration

projects to lower the cost and scope of wastewater treatment.

4. Began, through a contract with the Cape Cod Commission, the finalization of a regional wastewater management plan that will serve as a blueprint for a county wide vision for wastewater management.
5. Worked with individual towns on advancing their wastewater management agenda through the provision of technical assistance and guidance on an as needed basis.
6. Oversaw completion of the Shared Watershed grants meant to advance the development and feasibility of regional wastewater management solutions.
7. Continued outreach and education of the public through the media, the Collaborative website, www.capekeepers.org and through personal contact at public meetings and forums.

The Task Force members continue to develop an understanding of the wastewater management issues that face our Town while we await the findings of the MEP. Much remains to be done in terms of developing our plan to deal with these issues in a meaningful way.

WATER QUALITY ADVISORY COMMITTEE

The Water Quality Advisory Committee (DEN-WQAC) is concerned with fresh and salt water quality in Dennis. It conducts such studies and investigations necessary to advise, make recommendations and endorsements to other Town boards, committees, and commissions, as well as Barnstable County and the Cape Cod Commission (CCC).

As a result of the DEN-WQAC long term commitment to the Cape Cod Pond and Lake Stewards (PALS) program and coordination with Barnstable County, the DEN-WQAC received a report on the condition of the Town's freshwater ponds. This report is based on the water quality data collected by the DEN-WQAC between 2001 and 2008. The report entitled *Dennis Freshwater Ponds: Water Quality Status and Recommendations for Future Activities Final Report*, September 2009, prepared under the leadership of Ed Eichner, School for Marine Science and Technology (SMAST), University of Massachusetts Dartmouth. It includes detailed evaluations of six ponds selected for analysis by the DEN-WQAC: Bakers, Cedar, Coles, Eagle, Flax, and Scargo. These detailed analyses include watershed delineations and compare the water quality sampling results to state regulations and ecological benchmarks. Data from five additional ponds sampled by the DEN-WQAC are also summarized: Fresh, Hiram, North Simmons, Run, and White's. The report summarizes and analyzes the available water quality data and recommends future steps that are summarized and quoted from the report below:

1. Submit results from the detailed reviews of the six ponds to the state Department of Environmental Protection (MassDEP) for inclusion on the state's 2010 Integrated List of the Waters.
2. Develop TMDLs and remediation plans to meet the TMDLs for the two ponds that fail to meet state water quality regulations: Scargo and Cedar.
3. Request guidance from MassDEP regarding classification of other ponds with detailed reviews: Bakers, Coles, Eagle, and

Flax. Water quality in these ponds appears to be in acceptable condition.

4. Ensure that any TMDL development includes adequate sediment and storm water runoff information. Sediment characterization is recommended to include collection and incubation of sediments cores to adequately characterize nutrient regeneration. Stormwater runoff characterization is recommended to include collection and nutrient analysis of runoff samples.

5. Continue DEN-WQAC monitoring of all ponds to document water quality conditions and on-going compliance with state standards. It is recommended that sampling occur twice a year: once in April to establish pre-summer water quality conditions for that year and once in August/September to evaluate what are likely to be the worst water quality conditions. Sampling should continue to use PALS Snapshot procedures.

6. Develop bathymetric information for all ponds except Scargo, which already has adequate information.

7. Consider whether any of the 46 other ponds in town should also be monitored.¹

Thanks are extended to Harry Allen, Beach Coordinator, Dustin Pineau, Beach and Recreation Director, Joanne Iachetta, Beach Office Manager, and Jim Rondeau for their outstanding work in operating the beaches. Improvements have been made at several beaches this past year. The Dennis Housing Authority applied and received a grant from the Department of Housing & Community Development water conservation program to install 60 Low-Flow toilets through sustainability initiatives.

For the Housing Authority 2009 was filled with many challenges. The annual Budget was cut by 4.7%, and the Transitional Shelter program was cut by 50%.

The Housing Authority continues to maintain 100% occupancy rate in all programs.

Dennis Municipal Affordable Housing Trust

The Dennis Municipal Affordable Housing Trust meetings are normally held the last Wednesday of each month at 5:00 p.m. unless otherwise posted.

The Trust continues to work with Bailey, Boyd and Associates as our Housing Consultant to assist us in our tasks of completing the Planned Production Plan, adding affordable units developed under the Town's Municipal Sponsored Affordable Housing By-Law to the Town's Subsidized Housing Inventory, and assisting us in developing programs for affordable housing.

Habitat for Humanity after being awarded the developer for the three lots we received last year (2008) have begun construction phases and advertised for prospective households. Unfortunately, because of title issues we are not able to build on the lot located on Mill Street.

The Trust is working with the Town to develop the Old Melpet Farms. An RFP was issued in the fall of 2009 and responses are due the end of January.

We conducted a town wide survey the results of which are posted on the Town's Website all with the completed Town's Affordable Housing Needs Analysis. These two pieces of information have been incorporated into our Planned Production Plan which is now in its final draft for review by the Trustees at our January 2010 meeting.

In October we welcomed two new members to our board of trustees, Alice Juliano and Bill Gallerizzo. Unfortunately, at this same time Ellen Reil resigned. We thank Ellen for all her hard work in producing our monthly meeting minutes and on the Town wide survey as well as her contribution to the Trust.

As a Trust we can accept gifts of land, tax-deductable monetary donations and gifts of homes for the purpose of affordable housing. If you are interested in making a contribution, please contact us through the Town of Dennis.

Throughout the district we have seen over 6,000 walk-ins inquiring about their veterans' benefits on all levels, from the Federal, State and Local levels.

To make it easier on the veteran seeking some assistance we try to be a one-stop center for all their needs and the staff has worked extremely hard to provide the assistance to accomplish our goal of being the one-stop center.

During 2009 we saw over 6,000 veterans seeking some assistance. We obtained over \$30,000,000.00 in Federal benefits from the VA for Veterans in the district. We spent over \$700,000.00 in local assistance to needy veterans under Chapter 115 program in the district.

Caretakers of Veterans' Graves

During 2009, our committee's membership decreased from 11 to 10 with the retirement of long-time and valued former member Dick Swanson.

As in the past, we continued to adhere to our basic duties to:

1. Make every effort to see that any veteran's grave has an appropriate marker and new American flag before Memorial Day.
2. Oversee the condition of flags and markers during the course of the year, including especially Veterans Day, in all 6 active and 4 inactive Dennis cemeteries where veterans are known to be buried. Individual committee members are each assigned a particular cemetery to keep properly flagged and see that markers are functional and properly in place. The wind storms and ravages of winter caused members and volunteers to continually replace and/or repair if possible damaged flags.

Caretakers were also active in seeing that service flags flying at Merrill Memorial Park and its grounds continued maintained in a proper condition. Flags are now being brought down shortly after Veterans Day (November 11) and raised again prior to each Memorial Day with the help of some town firefighters and DPW workers. Also, the Dennis DPW and AMVETS post 333 have been especially helpful in providing an excellent park appearance where annual Veterans Day and some Memorial Day ceremonies are held. New plantings are donated by local merchants and planted by the AMVETS. A large new flag was hoisted on Route 6A in Dennis village with the special efforts of member Sam Franco and other committee members.

The help of several local organizations was necessary to enable the committee members to fulfill their obligations, particularly on Memorial Day.

In particular, our thanks are extended to AMVETS Post 333, VFW Post 10274, American Legion Post 488, and the Boy and Girl Scouts of America.

These groups also held their annual flag retirement ceremony at Merrill and invite the public to turn in worn flags to the AMVET flag boxes located in Dennis Town Hall, Fire Stations 1 and 2, and the Police Station, for burning next June. We are indebted to the Department of Public Works, in general, and David Johansen, Greg Rounseville, and Jeff Atterstrom in particular, for graciously filling our requests for the flags and markers.

CEMETERY ADVISORY COMMITTEE

Work began using ground penetrating radar to survey the Old South Dennis Cemetery behind Town Hall. This technology will confirm suspected burial locations and identify previously unknown sites. Our next step is to have 13 headstones repaired in that cemetery and erect an information board to guide visitors through the cemetery. We are indebted to the Community Preservation Committee for funding this project.

The third annual cemetery open house was held at the South Dennis Congregational Church Cemetery on May 23rd. Repaired gravestones were flagged, Diane Rochelle demonstrated headstone cleaning, and Terri Fox led two historic tours.

The Fannin-Lehner Consulting Group assessed the critical needs in the Dennis Village Cemetery and has provided the Town with a technical report of specifications for repairing broken grave markers. We continue to make progress restoring, preserving, and repairing these markers that provide an important historical record. Headstone repairs were completed by monument specialists in the West Dennis Cemetery.

The receiving tomb in the Dennis Village Cemetery was turned into a small museum displaying early burial practices by members of the Hearse House Committee who presented it to the Town in August. The Cemetery Advisory Committee is working on a management plan for the facility. Future projects include surveying the small family cemeteries, developing a brochure, and planning for a dedicated cremation area in the Dennis Village Cemetery.

Members Priscilla Husband and Carl Copp completed their terms and did not seek reappointment. Their service and input to the Committee was invaluable and we thank them for their efforts.

The CAC thanks DPW administrators David Johansen and Greg Rounseville, office assistants Mary Keener and Michelle Sands, and Crew Chief Jeff Atterstrom and his workers for their

dedication and cooperation. Their efforts on behalf of our cemeteries are appreciated. The Committee endeavors to help the public and respond to concerns. We welcome citizens to share questions and comments during the public discussion segment which is at the beginning of our meetings. Meeting dates are posted at the Dennis Town hall and are normally held the last Monday of the month at 7:00 P.M. at the Department of Public Works building.

Historical Commission

The Commission regrettably accepted the resignation of long-time member Margaret Eastman who has served faithfully for many years. Diane Rochelle has been appointed to fill the position.

We have received several applications for demolition of buildings and parts of buildings. Our demolition delay bylaw is applicable to buildings which are seventy five years or more old if significance to the town can be determined. This year, in each case, no historical or architectural significance could be established and all applications were allowed.

If the delay of one year is invoked, the Commission must attempt to find an interested party who can remove the building to a new location. As the number of available house lots in town decreases, we will have less and less chance to rescue our older buildings.

Our latest project, proposed by Burton Derick, is to research old names for areas in town, such as Sandy Bottom and Crowe's Pasture. We expect to learn much about the town as it was when the first Europeans arrived. The old names are descriptive of the area as it appeared to the first comers, much different than the town as it appears today.

Old King's Highway Regional Historic District

The number of applications being submitted for approval declined sharply by 12.6% from 2008 to 515. Application approval rates dropped slightly to 96.2%. Applicants continue to benefit from the streamlined process as the number of exemptions and amendments accounted for 51% of the applications. The committee has instituted a special exempt area for Solar Panels to accelerate the installation of alternative energy solutions for heating and electricity.

The biggest challenge is to work with applicants to develop new alternative energy solutions using wind and solar energy products that do not undermine the integrity of the Historic Act.

During the period from February through December, 2009, twenty-three (23) applications for Certificates of Appropriateness were received. Of these, 21 were approved with modifications, and 2 are pending. None were denied. A large number of the approvals were on projects which had received informal review prior to application, which smoothed the process greatly for both applicants and the Commission. The Commission urges all residents in the Historic District to review proposed projects in this informal fashion prior to the formal application to minimize any chance of denial of the application.

Two formal complaints were received by the Commission during the year, but only one was within the Commission's ability to act. The other involved modifications to the exterior of an historic home for which no Certificate of Appropriateness was ever sought; action on this continues. Another application was received after the work had been done, the applicant apparently unaware that a Certificate was needed; this was resolved amicably after negotiation between abutters, the applicant, and the Commission. To avoid such conflicts in the future, we urge all projects in the Historic District to be reviewed with the Historic Office of the Building Department prior to any work being done.

The Commission membership changed greatly early in the year. Chairman Jack March resigned, as did alternate member Nancy Thacher Reid. Both receive great thanks for the dedicated service they have provided to the community. Newly appointed to the committee were Gary Barber, Patrick Egan and Burton Derick. Both Mr. Barber and Mr. Egan bring construction experience to the Commission, and Mr. Derick is an historian.

Despite these appointments, the Commission remains short-handed: an alternate member is needed to assure a quorum at hearings. We urge anyone who may be interested in serving on the Commission to file a green card at the town office. You need not be a resident of the Historic District to apply.

We wish to thank the Building Department for their assistance and support, particularly Mr. Brian Florence. Special thanks go to our administrative assistant, LeeAnn Marcotte, who has gone above and beyond her regular duties to keep us all on the straight and narrow.

JERICHO HISTORICAL CENTER

Jericho Historical Center was established as a historical center in the early 1960's. The center which is comprised of an 1801 full cape home built by Captain Theophilus Baker and occupied by Baker family members from 1801 to 1955. During the year 2009, the museum was open during June through September for tours of the house and barn by appointment and for special programs throughout the year. The museum has a large collection of artifacts of the period. Visitors were from various parts of the United States, Canada and Europe.

In June, we welcomed the third grade students from the Ezra Baker School. Their comments and questions on the difference between their homes and our 1801 house were very insightful. A Victorian tea party was our opening reception in June. A display of antique aprons adorned the house and barn and was well received by our many visitors.

In August during Festival Days, Jericho was open on Sunday for old fashioned skills day where costumed guides demonstrated the talents that were needed for life in the 1800's. Again this year, the addition of sheep complimented the spinners. The antique car parade which passed right by our door was enjoyed by guests and docents alike.

On Sunday, September 27th, the museum was open for tours and many local residents attended. On December 19th, the Dennis Historical Society held their annual Christmas Open House at Jericho. The house was decorated with many floral and natural arrangements and refreshments were served by the Josiah Dennis Manse committee and docents.

Jericho could not operate without the Friends of Jericho. This is a very dedicated and loyal group of individuals who volunteer their time and expertise to our museum and the Committee wishes to thank them for their dedication to our Center. There is always a need for individuals to join the Friends of Jericho. If you are

1736 Josiah Dennis Manse Museum

Our thanks to the people of the town who voted in the necessary funding for this badly needed project and to those who donated so generously to the Manse Repair Fund. Thanks also go to the Department of Public Works for keeping our grounds neat and all of the ladies who worked so hard to keep our museum and gardens looking so nice.

The Manse will be closed next summer until the repairs and preservation work is completed.

1867 West Dennis Graded School House Oversight Committee

Acting as an advisory committee, we are charged with making recommendations to the Dennis Board of Selectmen for the maintenance and administration of the School House for the purpose of preserving its architectural and historic integrity. We also recommend and conduct educational programs for the town's citizens and others to help them understand the role of the Graded School in the daily lives of the 19th and 20th centuries.

Again this year, as in the past several years, we are strongly and urgently recommending the repainting of the building. The exterior paint of western façade has degraded dramatically – even more bare wood is visible in many places. Additionally, much of the trim paint is peeling and flaking badly. Without attention, we can anticipate damage to the exposed clapboards that will be expensive to repair.

Due to education budget cuts, we were not able to host the Ezra Baker elementary school tours as in the past. We hope to continue these in the future.

We are hosting the maritime exhibit from the Josiah Dennis Manse while the renovations of that building are underway. We will have open house hours on Wednesdays during the summer months this year so that visitors may see the artifacts.

We thank the West Dennis Garden Club for creating and maintaining a beautiful perennial garden on the grounds.

As always, the committee thanks the Building Maintenance department under Supt. Steve Estey for its continued fine service and care of this valuable and unique historic landmark.

Library Department

The Dennis Libraries is a system comprised of the Dennis Public Library and the four Village Libraries – Dennis Memorial Library, West Dennis Library, South Dennis Free Library, and Jacob Sears Memorial Library. The system works to fulfill its Mission Statement: “The Dennis Libraries provide current topics and titles, general information, and common gathering places for Dennis citizens and visitors.”

During April, the Dennis Libraries held the 2009 Dennis Reads Together, a month-long series of events, lectures, movies, and learning opportunities created around *March* by Geraldine Brooks, and the theme of the Civil War.

All Dennis Libraries provide access to the CLAMS (Cape Libraries Automated Materials Sharing) network, and specialized items such as large print books, periodicals, audio books, DVDs, music CDs, museum passes, online databases, public computer access and WIFI. Our services include reference and information, programs for adults, teens, and children, homebound delivery, computer classes, ESL classes, low vision resources, and community meeting spaces. The Dennis Libraries has subscriptions to Heritage Quest, Ancestry.com, and Overdrive downloadable media.

The Dennis Public Library had a busy and successful 2009 with increased circulation and community participation in activities. The library offered two film series, a variety of children’s programs, Teen Game Days and Teen Movie Nights, art shows, ESL classes, a book club, and an increased schedule of monthly programs for adults. The Friends of the Dennis Public Library continue to host the hugely popular Authors Friday series. New this year was the addition of Mango Languages, an online foreign language learning program, the Summer Movie Series, and the First Annual Wine, Women, and Words Fundraiser featuring nationally known authors Jennifer Weiner, Jane Green, and Lynn Kiele Bonasia. The library is a very busy public building that is utilized by an extensive list of community groups. Dennisport, like most locations, has been hit hard by the economic downturn, and the library’s use and

circulation has increased as local patrons search for ways to find employment, access educational materials, and find affordable entertainment. All of this is possible only with the dedication of the skilled staff and volunteers.

The Dennis Memorial Library has had another very successful year. Circulation, attendance, services, and computer usage have all significantly increased. Our downloadable books introduced last year is becoming more and more popular with our patrons, as is our newly introduced Mango self-paced foreign language program. The Low Vision Resource Center provided emergency bags to blind citizens in Dennis and we are in the process of offering new programs, lending some low vision equipment, and continuing to help low vision citizens. We received a gift of 9 new computers this Spring, allowing us to provide state of the art computers for our citizens. We continue to offer 24/7 WiFi. Libraries continue to be an inexpensive and valuable resource for the town as economic difficulties continue. We expect to continue to improve our services and see even greater growth in 2010.

2009 was good to the South Dennis Free Public Library, with circulation and collection continuing to grow, a great children's summer program on creating collages, and its 'Thursdays at Two' series just finishing a successful third year. It was also a year to nurture the library building, a South Dennis historical gem: new roof, fresh exterior paint, and pre-Civil War pine flooring refinished. Patrons continue to enjoy the library's unique blend of old and new.

The Jacob Sears Memorial Library has continued to grow in attendance and circulation, and continues to contribute to the Dennis Library System by providing patrons with books, videos, spoken cassettes and CDs, as well as information they need. We continually encourage the use of the CLAMS system through both pamphlets and personalized instruction. The Jacob Sears Memorial Library was placed on the **National Historic Register** in 2009. The library has become the home location for 'A Book in the Hand,' a group of writers and authors "celebrating the tactile pleasure of the printed page and the intimacy of the spoken word." Our program offerings continue to expand in both areas of interest and frequency. The programs have ranged from author talks, to music programs, and a wonderful program given by three-time Space

Shuttle Commander Rick Hauck. We have also had a very successful art exhibit program that changes on a monthly basis, with local painters, potters, weavers, and photographers participating. We have been doing our best to provide the community and visitors with a wonderful venue to visit, relax, and enjoy. We are proud to be a part of the Dennis Library System.

West Dennis Library was happy to again see growth in attendance, circulation and use of technology in 2009. The library has added a new computer as well as a large screen TV that is computer ready and can be used for power-point presentations as well as other applications. The library is currently working with the library of Perkins School for the Blind to add their materials to our catalog. The West Dennis Library is now the repository for many of the books and papers of The Dennis Historical Society. These items are available to be used by the public during normal library hours. Many organizations have utilized the library as a site for their meetings, among them the Cape Cod Beading Society and The Dennis Historical Society. Ongoing activities include Book Club, Mah Jongg and Intergenerational Knitting. Annual favorites continue to be the Book Sale and the visit of the Ezra H. Baker School second grade. The Friends of The West Dennis Library continues to support the library with activities and fundraisers.

Library staff members are assisted by dedicated, talented, and generous volunteers. Village library directors Nancy Symington (Dennis Memorial), Phil Inman (Jacob Sears), Anne Speyer (South Dennis) and Lew Taylor (West Dennis) join me in grateful appreciation for their outstanding contributions.

Cape Cod Regional Technical High School District

Cape Cod Regional Technical High School was established in 1973 as a public technical high school and provides an opportunity to acquire high quality technical, academic and social skills preparing students for success in our changing world. For our school year 2008 – 2009, we had 703 students enrolled in 18 different technical programs from our sending school district that comprises 12 towns from Mashpee to Provincetown with an operating budget of \$11,903,693.

- Cape Cod Regional Technical High School graduated 158 students in June of 2009.
- In addition to our renewable energy program, our tri-generation system has saved the district over \$160,000 this past year. This new concept demonstrates Cape Cod Tech's commitment to reducing annual energy consumption and that we are doing everything we can to reduce our energy costs.
- Capital improvements for the FY'09 included repaving of Cape Cod Tech's roadways and parking lots phase 1 and the installation of a security and camera surveillance system with the help of a \$50,000 Department of Justice grant through the Harwich Police Department.
- Due to lack of enrollment over the last 5 years, the Masonry Program was closed.
- This was quite a year for two of our Science Instructors, Charlie Bresnahan and Lynn Fleischer. Mr. Bresnahan was recognized for Outstanding Leadership in Energy Education by three prestigious organizations: Cape Light Compact, The Barnstable County Commission, and the Commonwealth of Massachusetts, House of Representatives. Both Science teachers and Cape Cod Tech were recognized by the

Commonwealth and received the 2009 Secretary's Award for Excellence in Energy and Environment Education. The House of Representatives further recognized Cape Cod Tech's Environmental Studies/Tech Prep Program and the Renewable Energy Education and Awareness Program. Two of our Administrators were asked to present our energy initiatives at a national conference in Arizona last fall.

- Skills USA is a national organization serving students enrolled in technical programs. This year our students brought home 3 gold, 5 silver, and 11 bronze in the district competition (all 3 gold medal winners are from the Town of Barnstable); 2 gold, 3 silver, and 3 bronze in the state competition; and in the national competition, we brought home a bronze medal in Marine Service Technology and first place in the 2009 National Sustainability Solutions Competition. In addition, 6 students received a first place in the Agri-Science Fair at the Future Farmers of America (FFA) State Convention.
- Cape Cod Tech provides money saving projects for our district and community and these projects not only save thousands of dollars, but also provide our students with real life work experience in supervised setting. For the 2008 – 2009 school year, the total estimated value of the savings to our sending towns from work completed by Cape Tech's technical shops was in excess of \$900,000.

The Dennis-Yarmouth Regional School District is responsible for providing a quality education for students from both Dennis and Yarmouth. A little known fact is the District now has the highest poverty rate on Cape Cod.

We continue to move forward in reaching the goal of the *No Child Left Behind* legislation, as well as the MCAS (Massachusetts Comprehensive Assessment System) scores, with some pitfalls along the way. The dropout rate continues to decline.

The Dennis-Yarmouth Regional School Committee is very much aware of the tough economic times faced by Dennis and Yarmouth, and we are trying to work with both towns to achieve the lowest possible budget, while still maintaining a quality education for our students. These students are our communities' most precious asset, and they hopefully will become our future leaders.

Eighty four percent of last year's high school graduating class went onto college. (Fifty one percent went onto a four-year program and 33 percent to a two-year program.) These students received over \$225,000 in scholarships and awards. Some of these colleges include Brown, Cornell, Dartmouth, Tufts, the U.S. Merchant Marine Academy, and many other fine colleges and universities.

In summary, we wish to thank the citizens of both towns for their continued support.

Public school districts are expected to continue to make progress toward meeting the goals of the *No Child Left Behind* (NCLB) legislation irrespective of the state of the economy or its impact on school budgets. It is my pleasure to report that most grade levels and schools in the District made significant progress this year as demonstrated by the 2009 Massachusetts Comprehensive Assessment System (MCAS) results.

District wide, more students are scoring in the advanced category and fewer students are scoring in the failing category. Most significantly, 81% of our tenth grade students scored in the proficient and advanced range in Mathematics thus meeting the goals of NCLB. Forty-nine percent of all tenth graders scored in the advanced range.

In English Language Arts, 84% met the goals of NCLB with 36% scoring in the advanced range.

The third MCAS requirement for graduation, science, has been in effect for two years. Eighty-one percent met the NCLB goal. Twenty-eight percent of our students scored in the advanced range. While there is more work to be done this is excellent progress toward the goal of 100% proficient and advanced work by 2014.

Our teachers and principals have used this data to improve instruction. The 2009 MCAS tests come just two years after the district began staff training in the use of protocols for using data. We are continuing this work and strengthening its impact through training on using teacher-created formative assessments to benchmark student progress throughout the year, using instructional coaches to support teachers, and training in *Keys to Literacy* to improve nonfiction reading skills in grades 4-8. Funding through the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act (ARRA) has been used to support these efforts.

Recently, the Department of Elementary and Secondary Education

(DESE) created a draft of *Essential Conditions for School Effectiveness*. These conditions can be found in educational research as the “best practices” and will undoubtedly be the conditions against which districts will be measured when audited by DESE in the future. Dennis-Yarmouth has implemented some of these practices. The areas that have already been implemented include: *Professional development and structures for collaboration; Aligned curriculum; Effective instruction; Assessment, and Addressing the social, emotional, and health needs of students.*

As of October 1, 2009 Dennis-Yarmouth enrolled 3,390 students. The free and reduced lunch percentages by school range from 27% to 48%, with an average of 36% district wide. Our number of English Language Learners continues to increase. On state testing of English Language Learners our students outperformed the state in all areas.

Finally, we have made significant progress in addressing our dropout rate. The dropout rates have not been finalized by the state, but we expect to see a dropout rate below 4% for 2008-2009.

We thank the town officials and the taxpayers of Dennis and Yarmouth for their support. Our students have some of the finest programs anywhere in Massachusetts. While many districts have been forced to cut programs in music, the arts and other co-curricular areas, we have been able to maintain these programs with your support. On behalf of our students I thank you for your continued support.

During the year ending December 31, 2009, the Dennis-Yarmouth Regional School District has proved to be challenging and rewarding in the areas of finance and operations.

Despite the negative economic conditions of the country, reduced state aid and budget cuts to the district for fiscal year 2009, the district ended the year with an excess and deficiency (E & D) amount of \$1,507,228 and used \$1,000,000 to balance the FY2010 budget. This offset reduced the assessments to the taxpayers of Dennis and Yarmouth. The state aid for fiscal year 2009 for the District was \$6,764,640, which was a reduction of \$138,054 from the original reimbursement estimate the state provided.

The Towns of Dennis and Yarmouth approved a level funded operating budget for fiscal year 2010 of \$48,711,320, which was the same amount approved for fiscal year 2009.

Currently, the school district is in the process of developing the 2010-2011 budget (fiscal year 2011). The budget development process begins in September with input from numerous groups ranging from the superintendent of schools, finance director, principals, parents, site councils and school committee. All have an important part in budget development. The school administration strives for open communication with Town officials on projected budget deficits in the areas of school choice, charter and special education costs when preparing our budget.

The school committee and administration have, under the direction of Knight, Bagge & Anderson, Inc., completed a short and long-range facilities plan to identify and prioritize the needs that continue to arise in our older buildings. Again, it has been our goal and the objective of the school committee to maintain safe, clean, healthy, educationally sound school facilities.

On May 5, 2009, the Town of Dennis approved \$200,000 for

preparing architectural and engineering plans, specifically for the roof and windows of the Ezra Baker Elementary School and \$130,000 for the Nathaniel Wixon Middle School for an upgrade on the clocks/communication system.

Last year we experienced an increase in school lunch participation. The food service program served appetizing, nutritious meals to children and young adults and made our cafeterias welcoming and fun. This program continues to concentrate on improving 1) menus, 2) financial independence, 3) purchasing, and 4) marketing.

In conclusion, I would like to thank the communities for their support. The Towns of Dennis and Yarmouth can be proud of our educational system and take pride in the influence that they have on our children.

Director of Instruction

Gloria Lemerise

The Office of Instruction is responsible for the planning and coordination of all aspects of learning. This ranges from providing and supervising professional development, refining curriculum to meet the needs of all learners, and monitoring student achievement as measured by the Massachusetts Comprehensive Assessment System (MCAS) and district assessments. To support these key efforts, the Director of Instruction must also be deeply involved in grant writing. The resources gained from numerous grants provide a major funding stream for professional development efforts that improve the instructional expertise of all our professionals. Much of what takes place on the district level reflects mandates from both federal and state departments of education and grant requirements. As we develop improvement plans and organize professional development, we continually focus on learning for all – students, teachers, administrators, and support staff.

With limited financial resources and the requirements of Education Reform and grant funding, the District is compelled to be sure all professional learning is focused on improving student learning. These events provide some basic content and pedagogical knowledge necessary to *begin* the professional learning. To move the learning into practice, teachers meet at least weekly in their Professional Learning Communities (PLC's). The PLC meetings create the opportunity to transfer the adult learning and improve practices measured by student results.

As students become more adept at using a wide range of technology applications in their academic and social lives, our instruction and curriculum must adapt. Digital media brings numerous opportunities for both students and teachers to be connected worldwide in the 21st century, creating a profound need to update our information and communication skills. During both the school year and summer, our Instructional Technology Director provides graduate level courses that focus on the skilled use of a wide variety of 21st century tools and resources. Grants fund opportunities for our staff to attend workshops focusing on the latest uses of technology in the classroom.

The students in our district represent a wide variety of cultures and languages. We have been fortunate to have certified English as Second Language (ESL) teachers working with children who are not yet proficient in English. These teachers provide direct student services and support general education teachers in sheltered English instruction. Their expertise makes it possible to provide specific professional development opportunities for their colleagues intended to optimize the instruction in every classroom.

Though the results of this year's MCAS show improvement, the District still faces challenges within the subgroups. Using data, maintaining high standards for all learners, and working in a collaborative environment focused on student learning, allows us to apply our professional learning and continue toward closing the achievement gap. We look to working with our families and communities as full partners in these efforts to meet the demands of the 21st century.

Technology Department

Lory Stewart, Director of Instructional Technology

Chris Machado, Director of Technology

The Dennis-Yarmouth Regional School District Technology Department provides services to all schools and the Central Office. In January of 2009, John Carey replaced Dan Smith as a technology technician. The department supports the infrastructure necessary to maintain our networks, repairs hardware, installs software and provides professional development to staff to integrate technology into the curriculum.

During the school year an all day in-service was held for staff that was dedicated to the effective use of technology in the classroom for students grades K-12. In addition there were five graduate courses devoted to technology integration offered within the district. Over 100 teachers took advantage of these offerings.

Because of a grant award, the District was able to use the newly available Massachusetts Department of Elementary and Secondary Schools (MA DESE) supported Data Warehouse to analyze MCAS data to drive decisions regarding individual students and school wide progress toward meeting curricular goals and targeting areas of need within the district. The district received a continuation grant that will now allow us to input our own data based on local assessments. Professional development that will aim at areas of need will also be made available through the use of the grant funds.

In the summer and early fall, the High School was migrated to a new web-based version of our grade book software. All schools now use the same version of this software that allows teachers to maintain a grade book with student grades from any computer with an Internet connection.

The District migrated its electronic mail system to the Google Apps for Education Platform. This new system offers email, shared calendars, documents and many other on-line communication and collaboration tools designed for educational use.

The DYRSD Technology Department makes every effort to stay current on emerging technologies to best serve our school community and ensure strong support of its technological needs.

Director of Pupil Services

Judith D. Dion

There are currently five hundred twenty-six students receiving special education services. Approximately fifty students require very specialized services and are placed in day or residential programs. Services may include specialized education, and related services such as speech therapy, occupational or physical therapy, behavioral intervention, social work services, vision and medical services.

As of June 30, 2009 there were over a hundred students who are provided with services under the McKinney-Vento Homeless Education Act in our district. These students and families may live in shelters, motels, or are doubled up with relatives or friends. There is also an increase in the number of unaccompanied youth who are not in the custody of a parent or guardian.

To offset the loss of state revenues, we applied for and received American Recovery and Reinvestment Act (ARRA) monies. Activities funded through the ARRA grants are “designed to strengthen education, drive reforms and improve results for students.” Specifically, the ARRA-Individuals with Disabilities Education Act (IDEA) funds ensure that students with disabilities receive a Free and Appropriate Public Education (FAPE) and are prepared for further education, employment and independent living. These monies also support lost revenues from Circuit Breaker, a specialized behavioral program, a transitional vocational component, and professional development for staff.

The DY transitional vocational component allows high school students with significant disabilities to develop employability skills and to obtain community based employment. The School-to-Career Assistant has already initiated a recycling program, established prevocational internship sites through JTEC, and developed four community based training sites. We thank our Dennis-Yarmouth Regional High School staff, Foley Medical Supplies Center, Windsor Skill Nursing and Rehabilitation Center,

Yarmouth Senior Center, and the Clarion Inn, for allowing our students to experience genuine and valued work experiences.

Other professional development activities are designed to support staff to work with students with mental health and behavioral challenges.

In addition, the ARRA funds coupled with an additional grant are supporting professional development to increase literacy training of personnel and to examine effective practices to improve the reading performance of students with disabilities in Kindergarten through Grade 3.

Food Service Department

Garth Petracca, Coordinator

Our economy is weak. Jobs are hard to find. Everyone has less money but our students still need to be fed. It is vitally important that all members of our school community who might qualify for free or reduced lunch and breakfast complete and submit an application. Financially, this provides us with assistance in helping to feed all our students.

One of our goals has always been to reimburse the school system's General Fund to the extent that is financially possible without detracting from the food service program itself. We will continue this practice and make changes in the program as needed. We currently use cooperative purchasing and competitive bidding on everything we buy which enables us to secure the best prices for all our products and services.

Our participation rates are holding at 75 percent even with continued declining enrollment which is a testament to the success of the program. Food costs are at 45 percent, labor at 45 percent, and other expenses at 10 percent.

We highly value what we accomplish on a daily basis in our department. Our "home meal replacements" are designed to provide healthy, satisfying and continued choices to our customers, the children of the Dennis-Yarmouth Regional School District.

Kenneth T. Jenks, Principal

Dennis-Yarmouth Regional High School

As always, I begin my annual school report by thanking the citizens of Dennis and Yarmouth for supporting our school. D-Y's achievements are directly connected to the support provided by our communities. The high school's October 2009 enrollment was 935 students. The graduating class of 2009 reflected the strengths of the high school program. Eighty-four percent of the class of 2009 planned to attend college: fifty-one percent planned to attend a four year college or university and thirty-three percent planned to attend a two year college. Many students in the class of 2009 pursued other opportunities: three percent planned to go to a technical school, nine percent planned to enter the workforce, three percent planned to join the armed forces and the remainder were undecided about their future plans. The students in the class of 2009 collectively received over \$225,000 in scholarships and awards. Our students, families, faculty and staff appreciate the many generous individuals, organizations and businesses that provided this vital financial support for our students.

We are committed to *Pursuing Excellence, Demonstrating Character*. The high school continues to stress a core program of English, foreign language, math, science, and social studies. We offer a wide range of courses and programs to our students. We provide many Advanced Placement and honors level courses for students who pursue the most challenging academic options. This year, seventy D-Y students are enrolled in online classes through the Virtual High School program. We value a well-rounded education for all of our students, and as a result, our graduation requirements call for students to complete course work in elective areas including art, technology, health and physical education, and music. We support career oriented options including work based learning and nearly one hundred students participated in internships with local businesses this year. We have a strong working relationship with Cape Cod Community College and many of our students take classes at the community college level. D-Y students can also pursue alternative paths to graduation through participation in our day and evening alternative learning programs.

As we prepare for our next New England Association of Schools and Colleges accreditation, we are incorporating 21st century academic and technical skills into our program.

D-Y continues to make progress toward our state Adequate Yearly Progress goals. We continue to reduce the drop out rate and the majority of our high school MCAS scores are at or above the state average. Our many co-curricular activities provide numerous opportunities for our students. The music program enjoyed success again this year: the band placed sixth in the US Scholastic Band Association Northern States Championships and the color guard came in *first* at this same competition. Art students continue to be recognized for their skills. Student government and our school's service groups continue to donate hundreds of hours and thousands of dollars to charities and our communities. Our athletes are competitive and many teams have enjoyed winning seasons. D-Y teachers continue their efforts to improve our programs--they have been awarded grants and they have been recognized for their work.

Our school is thankful for the support our towns have provided in the past and we hope both Dennis and Yarmouth will continue to provide the moral and fiscal support necessary for success in the coming years.

Nathaniel H. Wixon Middle School

It is an honor to submit this annual town report for Nathaniel H. Wixon Middle School. Wixon serves 4th – 8th grade students for the Town of Dennis. According to the October 1, 2009 enrollment report, Wixon has a total of 465 students. Five of our students attend through the School Choice option. We have 78 professional and non-professional staff members on the Wixon team. Our school also hosts a Cape Cod Collaborative Program for students with significant disabilities. The entire Wixon staff is highly committed to teaching and learning, school safety and fostering parent/ community partnerships.

Wixon provides a rigorous academic program with a class size average of 20 students/class. Academic offerings include: English language arts, mathematics, social studies, science, art, music, physical education, health, and technology. Foreign language is offered to students in grades six, seven and eight. Students may also choose to take instrumental music, chorus or strings during the school day. We offer a variety of after school activities and enrichments such as Peer Mediation, Leaders of Tomorrow (L.O.T.), French & Spanish Clubs and interscholastic athletics. Our fifth graders receive Drug Abuse Resistance Education (D.A.R.E.) from Officer Jim Winn of the Dennis Police Department and each class engages in a unique weeklong NEED Collaborative Seashore experience; a long-standing tradition for DYRSD students.

Wixon welcomed two new professional staff members from other District schools this year: Deborah Clark, Special Education Teacher, and Brenda Crowell, Occupational Therapist. School Resource Officer/Detective Patrick McCaffrey also joined the team.

Thanks to the generosity of the Town of Dennis, our intercom/communication system was upgraded last summer. This much-needed safety improvement placed phones in each classroom providing privacy, as well as a voice mail system to facilitate more efficient home/school communication.

The Wixon School Council provides guidance to improve our school. Thanks go to this group of volunteers including: Maureen Anderson, Warren Bateman, Kathy Fahle, Kate Franklin, Karen Medve, Angela Persechino, Patricia Plucinski, and community representative, Cindi Cabot. The Parent Teacher Advisory Council (PTAC) supports many educational and enrichment programs, including curriculum-related field trips and cultural enrichment presentations for all students through community-building events and fundraising. We are grateful to the PTAC and our parents for their tireless efforts to support learning. PTAC officers are Terri Bunce, President; Deb Bateman, Vice-President; Beth Newhard, Secretary; and, Pam Sullivan, Treasurer.

We would like to acknowledge and thank the Town of Dennis officials including the Dennis Police and Fire Departments as well as members of the Dennis-Yarmouth Regional School Committee for their continuous support and service to our school.

Mattacheese Middle School

M. Catherine Wollak, Principal

On behalf of our faculty, staff, parents and students, I respectfully submit to you the annual report for Mattacheese Middle School. The learning community at MMS is fully engaged in supporting our middle age youth in the town of Yarmouth. This is accomplished via the middle school teaming model. In doing so we embrace daily professional dialogue about student needs and the best way to address them

Middle level education attends to the academic, social and emotional needs of our students in grades six through eight. We offer a rigorous middle level education that includes the traditional core academic subjects but also the social experiences that enrich the learning experience. We cover instruction in English Language Arts, Mathematics, Social Studies and Science as well as visual arts, world languages, technology, health and fitness, vocal and instrumental music, and library sciences. Beyond the curriculum offerings we also provide time in the day for enrichment activities and more specific skills instruction. Outside of the school day we tap the resources of staff and community members to offer three seven-week sessions of extended learning classes and after school activities. We have also extended the week to include two Saturday mornings a month as academic support time. Staff sign on to work with students one-on-one and in small groups reinforcing needed skills or guiding students through classroom assignments.

The learning community at Mattacheese Middle School extends beyond its doors to the parents and community at large. Parents in our PTO generously give of their time and resources to support many of our co-curricular and enrichment programs for our youth. The Mattacheese School Council comprised of parents, a community representative and faculty members, meets monthly to review our School Improvement Plan and discuss current issues and concerns of our larger community that impact our student learners.

Faithful to the mission of our school, we work diligently to provide the instruction necessary for children to reach their academic

potential. Our efforts have retooled our skills using data to inform instruction, and working in collaborate teams to enhance learning. We gain a better understanding of our students' needs and assist them in gaining ground reaching the "Adequate Yearly Progress" benchmark set by the Massachusetts Department of Elementary and Secondary Education in alignment with the No Child Left Behind initiative. We are committed to reaching our goals and providing instructional opportunities in those identified areas of need for all students to reach proficiency or advanced level of achievement.

On behalf of the Mattacheese learning community, we thank our partners at the school district's administration office as well as the grounds, maintenance, and cafeteria crews. We acknowledge the challenges that face our school committee and our town's elected officials and are appreciative of their support. Most importantly, we thank our students and their parents for their involvement and continued faith in the mission of our school, Mattacheese Middle School.

Ezra H. Baker Elementary School

Kevin Depin, Principal

It is with great pride that I submit this report on the progress at the Ezra H. Baker School. This year, when our school opened in September, we greeted 380 students in grades kindergarten through three. We offer an integrated early childhood program for an additional 30 three and four year olds in our town. Our school is home to the Special Education Alternative Learning Site (SEALS) Program. This program is designed to educate young children with significant health challenges. We are home to the Specialized Teaching Alternative Room (STAR). This program works to meet the educational needs of children diagnosed with autism in Pre-Kindergarten through grade 3. Our daycare includes children up through fifth grade, and has nearly ninety children enrolled in either before or after school care.

In the spring of 2009, three very dedicated teachers, Miss Mary Healy, Mrs. Jane Cutler, and Ms. Lisa Lawson, decided to retire after years of service to the children of our town. Each of these women added tremendously to the fabric of our school community in different ways: Miss Healy spent more than 30 years with our youngest students in kindergarten; Mrs. Cutler pioneered looping at our school, a practice of spending two years with one group of children; and Miss Lawson finished her career at Baker, where she began thirty years earlier, as our reading teacher. The spring of 2009 also marked the last at Ezra H. Baker for Dr. Lisa McMahon, our co-principal for the 2008-2009 year. Dr. McMahon's departure to assume the responsibilities as principal in Kingston, MA ushered in the return of Ellen Gagliardi Flanagan, our Dean of Students.

Our students continue to thrive! Our professional focus in the 2008-2009 school year centered around math instruction. Teachers met in professional learning groups throughout the year to study state curriculum, district guidelines, and student work samples. As teachers learned together, they were able to alter classroom instruction, helping to deepen student understanding of important mathematical concepts. Families were important partners in this endeavor, as evidenced by the overwhelming participation in our annual math fair. Though math was an

important focus, students continued to do well in all areas of the curriculum. Our students benefit from weekly lessons in the related arts. Students in second grade completed an interdisciplinary project in which they read a biography about an artist and then completed an artistic piece copying the artist's style. Students in all grades participated in a Jump for Heart program which combined exercise and community service. Our monthly whole school meetings are enhanced by songs students learn in music class.

As always, we are fortunate to receive tremendous support from our parent group and from the Dennis community. In difficult economic times, PTAC has stepped in to provide students with valuable extensions to their learning. Students visited Buttonwood Zoo, The Cape Cod Museum of Natural History, The Boston Children's Museum and Plimoth Plantation due to the support of our families and PTAC. With the continued support from the Town Departments and the citizens of Dennis, our 78th year serving the students of Dennis will be our best yet.

Laurence C. Mac Arthur Elementary School

It is a pleasure to submit this Annual Report for the Laurence C. Mac Arthur Elementary School. (LCM) Our current enrollment of 236 students in grades K-3 is divided into 12 classrooms. We also have one of the DYRSD Early Education programs housed here at LCM. During the past year we were able to reconfigure our office to make use of limited space while providing a safe and welcoming entry for all of our visitors. We continue to make use of all space in our 59-year-old facility and prioritize maintenance needs.

With our school theme of *Set Sail for Success*, our academic and social curriculums provide each student with the opportunity to learn and thrive. Our professional staff continues to expand their knowledge of best practices through weekly meetings as Professional Learning Communities in each grade level. Specific emphasis is placed on peer collaboration, walk-throughs, common assessment to inform instruction, looking at student work, flexible grouping, technology in the classroom and use of data strengthen instructional practices across all grade levels. Additionally, we have expanded our student peer-mentoring program where older students are paired with younger students to work together to build pro-social skills such as caring, kindness, respect and responsibility. We also continue to offer a wide array of after school enrichment sessions to expand opportunities beyond the school day.

Our very active PTO under the leadership of Jami Carder, Tammy Horne, Julie Pelletier, and Alyson Taubert gives countless amounts of time to coordinate many events such as our Book Fair, Holiday Fair, field trips and school programs. Additionally, we welcome many volunteers in our school ranging from high school students, to parents, grandparents and Elder Services. The LCM School Council comprised of Alyson Taubert, Jocelyn Howard, Cookie Stewart and Mackie Rice focuses on our home/school survey, school improvement plan, and articulating our vision. Their commitment of time and positive interactions enhance our school

mission. As always our partnership with both the Yarmouth Police and Fire Departments brings us important connections in the area of safety.

Finally, on behalf of the LCM school community, I wish to thank the good citizens of Yarmouth for their support of our school in *Setting Sail for Success!*

MARGUERITE E. SMALL SCHOOL

Emily A. Mezzetti, Principal

It is with pride that I submit to you the Annual Report for the Marguerite E. Small School on behalf of our students, faculty, staff, and parents.

Our professional and support staff members work together to maximize the educational experience we provide for our town's fourth and fifth grade students. This year's initiatives include enhanced language arts instruction, increased use of assessment to help maximize students' skill development, and emphasis on professional collaboration among faculty members to share best practices. Funds from the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act also facilitated the hiring of a school-based English Language Learner teacher for our students for whom English is not their first language.

Modifying our daily schedule has had an exceptionally positive impact on the educational experience we offer our students. We now share bus transportation with Mattacheese Middle School. Our day begins and ends thirty minutes earlier. This allows us to offer better after school programs while sharing the middle school's late buses at four and five o'clock each evening.

This year we successfully applied for a 21st Century Community Learning Centers Program Grant. We received \$125,000 in federal funds, overseen by the Massachusetts Department of Elementary and Secondary Education. These funds have allowed us to offer an after school and summer program for forty-six fourth grade students. We thank our collaborating agencies who have worked together with us on this fantastic endeavor including: Yarmouth Recreation, Yarmouth Fire Department, Yarmouth Police Department, Yarmouth Town Libraries, Dennis-Yarmouth Regional School District's Music and Drama Departments, Boy Scouts of the Cape and Islands, Cultural Center of Cape Cod, Cape Cod Museum of Natural History, and the District Attorney's Office of Barnstable County. Together this school year we have offered eight hours each week of wonderful activities in academics,

recreation, and the arts, and we look forward to facilitating a high quality and collaborative summer program.

Parent involvement enriches our school's culture. Our Parent Teacher Organization, chaired the last two years by Dawn-Marie Flett, works exceptionally hard raising funds to support grade-level field trips and enrichment programs here at our school. The School Council meets monthly to develop and oversee our School Improvement Plan and provided valuable insight and support. Both groups are integral to our strong culture, and I thank the parents and community members who so generously share their time with us.

As I conclude my twelfth year as a principal in the Dennis-Yarmouth Regional School District, I would like to thank the Dennis-Yarmouth Regional School Committee, our central office administrators, the M.E. Small faculty, staff, parents, and the members of our community who have helped to enhance our school this past year. I look forward to our continued work together to maximize the educational experience we provide our fourth and fifth grade students.

Station Avenue Elementary School

Lisa M. Whelan, M. Ed., Principal

It is with great pride and enthusiasm that I submit this Annual Report of the Station Avenue Elementary School. I have been quite impressed with the amount of professionalism, experience, and commitment that the Dennis-Yarmouth School District gives to the students of our system. Our team of teachers at Station Avenue has worked endlessly to support and enrich one another with the experiences that we have and share. Building a team of professionals to support the educational well being of our students is our #1 goal. We were fortunate to make adequate yearly progress in MATH on the 2009 MCAS due to the combined team efforts of our educational professionals. This takes us out of the needs improvement status in MATH.

Math has been a school wide focus over the past two years. Through looking at student work, researching best practices in the area of number sense instruction, and using data in this area to drive our teaching practices, we have been able to increase our math number sense achievement on the 2009 MCAS. We are continuing to provide professional development opportunities to the staff in this area. We are fortunate to have a math coach in the elementary schools this year through the federal American Recovery and Reinvestment Act grant.

Additionally, we have been able to continue our progress and development of reading interventions. All second grade Title One students have exposure to a new early literacy program, Leveled Literacy Interventions. Our classroom teachers are continually collaborating and analyzing student work in reading to promote instructional practices that focus on individual student needs.

Our Consulting Teacher of Reading, Reading Recovery team and Title One team have worked closely to promote early literacy practices and interventions within the entire school. The Education Foundation for Dennis and Yarmouth was able to support a grant towards our all school read aloud program. This has provided the school the opportunity to purchase read aloud books for all of our

classrooms. Through these initiatives, we continue our focus of improving results for all learners.

With the support of the Dennis-Yarmouth School District, we are fortunate to have three team leaders and a school dean at our school again this year. This team has worked to facilitate and support the principal with the data inquiry process. Our vision at Station Avenue School is to use data and assessments to drive the instruction in our classrooms. By having team leaders, these leaders facilitate grade level meetings and support teachers with the process. Our school dean, Mr. Steven McDonough, has been an invaluable and supportive person to our entire school community. He works closely with the staff and principal of the school to instill positive values and role modeling each day. Based upon discipline data for the past two years, we take pride in stating that our discipline has dropped considerably due to the proactive measures that our staff and administration take each day.

The Station Avenue School appreciates strong support from the school community and from our surrounding business community. The SAE School Council provides guidance and initiative to help improve our school. This council membership includes teacher representatives, Cheryl Warren, Charlene Carey, Steven McDonough, Camila Oliveira; and parent representatives, Christina Carey, Patty Chadwick, Laurie Simonian; and our community representative, Barbara Adams, a long time Kindergarten teacher. We are extremely grateful to the PTO members and their officers for their service to our school community. Our parents are an integral part of our school community. We hosted our first multicultural event in September 2009. Based upon the turnout, we will continue this as a traditional family event in our school. It has helped to promote community involvement and a deeper appreciation for the various countries and cultures that we represent in our school.

Our school currently has approximately 42 English Language Learners. This is approximately 10% of our school population. With the support of the district administration, as well as our talented faculty, our school now houses the first ELL classroom in the state. Our English Language Learners are now receiving

recommended time learning English language skills to help them succeed in academic areas. We have been very excited about the implementation of this program. Through the systematic approach and instruction, we predict that our English Language Learners will continue to make successful gains in the classroom.

We deeply appreciate the support and services of the D-Y school system as well as those provided by other Town of Yarmouth agencies, including the Yarmouth Police Department, Fire Department and the Recreation Department. They have been an enormous support to our school programs. Additionally, the Yarmouth Rotary Club, as well as the Education Foundation for Dennis and Yarmouth, has been supportive organizations to our students.

We are in the midst of some very difficult economic times, and our endless team support has been able to accomplish many district and academic goals despite this recession. All of our successes as a school would not be possible without the support and efforts of our elected School Committee members who continue to volunteer their time and are dedicated to our educational mission for the children of the Dennis-Yarmouth Schools.
